Fairbanks will be told officially of his nomination as the Republican candidate for vice-president will be held at his residence at 2 o'clock on the afternoon of August 31 it was announced to-day. The membership list of the executive committee has been completed and the chairman of the sub-committees to make the detailed arrangements for the notification also have been appointed. The ceremonies will be under the auspices of the national committee on notification.
Lawrence Y. Sherman, United States Senator from Illinois, chairman of the committee will be the principal speaker at a rally at 8 o'clock in the evening following the notification. A parade will precede the rally.
