## CRANE CODE GIVEN SOME CRITICISM

### Experts Go Over the Tentative Draft of the New Standards

The tentative draft of the safety code of the Industrial Board, covering the structural features and operations of electric traveling cranes was considered at a conference at the Capitol yesterday, called by Commissioner John Price Jackson, chairman of the Industrial Board. Representatives of industrial plants and officials of the Department of Labor and industry participated in the discussions. Among those present were: A. H. Lintz and S. E. Hassel, of the American Steel and Wire Company; J. S. Herbert and C. W. Parkhurst, of the Cambria Steel Company; E. Friedlander, of the Carnegie Steel Company; J. R. Menish, of the Keystone Lubricating Company; M. C. Goodspeed, of the General Electric Company; Commissioner Jackson, of the Department of Labor and Industry; William Young, member of the Industrial Board; William Lauder, secretary of the Industrial Board; and R. Palmer, Chief of the Bureau of Inspection, and R. M. Penneck, safety engineer of the Labor Department; S. R. Hipple, Simplex Surface Contact Company; R. F. Gale, Midvale Steel Company; William Haynes, William Sellers & Company, Philadelphia, and L. R. Johnson, safety expert, Compensation Rating and Inspection Bureau, 302 Finance Building, Philadelphia.

## Receiver Is Asked For Boston and Maine R. R.

Boston, Mass., Aug. 23.—Pending conferences among the numerous interests effected no immediate action was expected to-day in consequence of a petition for a receiver for the Boston and Maine Railroad Company, which was filed in the Federal Court yesterday. It was pointed out that if some form of reorganization could be agreed upon before August 31, when \$13,500,000 of the road's notes matured, it would be possible for the directors to reconsider the decision yesterday that it would be expedient to attempt further renewal of the notes. No hope that a plan which would meet the wishes of all the leased lines could be evolved was expected, however. The next formal step will be the filing of the railroad's answer to the receivership petition, which was made by the intercontinental Rubber Company of New Jersey, a creditor to the extent of \$51,000. The directors declined to give any intimation as to the probable nature of this answer.

## PUTS VANADIUM DEAL THROUGH

### Replogle Forms Syndicate to Buy \$7,000,000 Plant at Pittsburgh

Philadelphia, Aug. 23.—J. Leonard Replogle, who engineered the negotiations which led to the sale of the Cambria Steel Company to the Midvale Steel and Ordnance Company for \$73,000,000, is putting through a new deal of large proportions. Mr. Replogle, vice-president for only a little more than a year of the American Vanadium Company of Pittsburgh, controlling 92 to 95 per cent of the world's supply of vanadium, virtually has completed negotiations by which ownership of the company will pass to a powerful financial group. Mr. Replogle will be president of the new company. To effect the purchase of the company from the controlling interests, the Plannerys of Pittsburgh, Mr. Replogle has enlisted the aid of a syndicate headed by Kuhn, Loeb & Co. of New York. It includes also Casatt & Co. and Chandler Brothers & Co. of Philadelphia, and Harrison Williams of Cleveland, Ohio. For the outstanding 7,000 shares of stock of the American Vanadium Company the syndicate will give \$1,000 a share, or \$7,000,000, payable \$650 in cash and \$350 in 6 per cent five-year notes of a new company to be formed under the existing corporate name. The new company will be capitalized at \$11,000,000, including \$5,000,000 of preferred stock and \$6,000,000 of common stock. It understood that a certain amount of the preferred stock will be offered for public subscription and that this amount already has been underwritten by a banking syndicate. While Mr. Replogle will be president of the new company, James J. Flannery will be chairman of the board of directors. The American Vanadium Company has extensive mines in Peru, whence its ores are derived, and to manufacture alloys it has a plant at Bridgeville, Pa. Before Mr. Replogle went with the company as vice-president he was vice-president of the Cambria Steel Company, whose services he entered as a boy.

## Tells of Being Caught in Ice While Going to Relief of Macmillan Expedition

New York, Aug. 23.—Jerome Allen of Maquoketa, Iowa, a member of the Hovey Arctic Expedition, which met with misfortune on its way to the relief of the Macmillan expedition party, has arrived here from Copenhagen, with details of the expedition's failure. The Macmillan party was in search of Peary's "Crocker land," reported by subsequent explorers to have been a mirage instead of land. Dr. E. O. Hovey and his party left New York in July, 1915, on the power schooner George B. Cluett, equipped by the American Museum of Natural History. They were caught in the ice early last winter near Cape York, off the northern coast of Greenland, through an accident to the vessel's machinery. Mr. Allen, Dr. Hovey and others in the party then started on a 1,300 mile dog sled journey across in Greenland in January to get aid, but Dr. Hovey caught a severe cold after traveling to the ship. After two months of traveling, Mr. Allen said, the sled party reached Egedesminde, a Danish settlement. Here they took a steamship for Denmark. Subsequently the steamship Denmark was dispatched to relieve those remaining on the Cluett, all of whom were well, Mr. Allen said, when he left.

## PENROSE ASSAILS REVENUE BILL

### Declares Democrats Wildly Extravagant; Offers Resolution

Washington, Aug. 23.—Senator Penrose, as ranking minority member of the finance committee, offered in the Senate yesterday a resolution to recommit the revenue bill to the committee. His resolution, which follows the lines of the motion to recommit the bill in the House, made by Representative Fordney, of Michigan, ranking Republican on the ways and means committee, follows: "Resolved, That H. R. 15763 be re-committed to the committee on finance, with instructions to amend the bill so as to raise an equitable portion of the required revenue from a protective tariff sufficient to protect adequately American industry and American labor, and to be so adjusted as to prevent undue actions by monopolies or trusts; and "With further instructions to the committee on finance to give special attention to securing the industrial independence of the United States, to the end that our industries can be so organized that they will become not only a commercial bulwark, but a powerful aid to national defense; and "That the bill be further amended so as to require the tariff commission to report the difference in wages and the cost of production between foreign countries and the United States." \$200,000,000 Wasteful Appropriations In his speech yesterday Senator Penrose said: "No amount of ingenious reasoning will alter the fact that, outside of preparedness, there is at least \$200,000,000 of wasteful appropriations in expenditure in the present Congress. That condition of the Treasury will absolutely necessitate the withholding of contracts for battleships and delay the whole scheme of preparedness. "The amount appropriated in the Sixty-third Congress was \$100,000,000 in excess of that of any other Congress in the history of the government, and when the country realizes what this Congress has done it will be simply dumfounded. "I say this carnival in lavish expenditures will reach nearly \$2,000,000,000, when we take account of \$25,000,000 for the Danish islands, the amount of \$60,000,000 which the gov-

ernment will probably have to refund as a result of the 5 per cent rebate allowed on importations brought over in American bottoms, and other matters which are likely to come up.


