

SWEENEY WARNS OF FRUIT SELLING

Chief of Standards Calls Attention to the Requirements of State's New Law

Fruit dealers and others who sell peaches or other fruits by the basket or crate instead of by weight, measure or count, as the law directs, are placing themselves in danger of arrest, says James Sweeney, chief of the State Bureau of Standards.

In the course of an interview to-day the chief says: "This being the season of the year when there are large quantities of peaches and potatoes, notwithstanding the requirements of the law that all commodities must be sold by weight, measure or count, many dealers persist in the practice of selling by the crate or basket. This is in direct violation of the law and the dealer subjects himself to the penalties imposed by the act of assembly."

"The consumer in every purchase should insist in knowing the amount in weight or measure of his purchase and refuse to buy commodity of any kind by the basket, crate, etc."
