GREAT LABOR DEMONSTRATION

1,500 Union Workers, Uniformed, March Three Abreast Over City Streets

One of the greatest organized labor demonstrations the city has ever witnessed was given yesterday afternoon when more than 1,500 union workers paraded over five miles of city streets.

It was the first general Labor Day parade of its kind for Harrisburg and the men, marching three abreast, and uniformed, made an interesting scene. Many bands were in line and promptly at 3 o'clock the time set for the start the front line of the parade swung out Market street. The route extended to Thirteenth street, to Derby, to Fourth and Sixth, to Reily, to Second, to Market Square, counter-marching in the Square.

Fire bells rang as the men passed the engine houses and cheer after cheer was given as each organization passed by. Chief Marshal Frank C. Hoffman was assisted by the following aids: C. R. Zimmerman, Trainmen's Lodge, No. 127; D. S. Wenrick, Carpenters' Union, No. 287; H. N. Brooks, Painters and Decorators' Union, No. 411; C. D. Rhinehart, Typographical Union, No. 14; H. L. McLaughlin, Trolley-men's Union, No. 709; R. E. Adair, Chauffeurs' Union, No. 428; F. L. Richardson, Pressmen's Union, No. 123, and Wilson Lehr, Plumbers' Union.

Prof. Wm. L. Gooding, of Dickinson, Dies Suddenly

Carlisle, Pa., Sept. 5.—Stricken suddenly with a heart attack while seated at the dinner table yesterday afternoon, Prof. William Lambert Gooding, for 18 years the occupant of the chair of philosophy and education at Dickinson College, died at his home here a short time later. Dr. Gooding had been in ill health for two years, but was able to continue his work. Had he lived four more months he would have been eligible for a Carnegie pension.

A certain class of prejudiced and jealous doctors call patent medicines only alcoholic beverages.
