PRUGH TALKS ON PROHIBITION

Tells Sunday School Workers of Evils Caused by Saloon

Dr. B. E. P. Prugh State chairman of the Prohibition party, was one of the principal speakers last night at the closing sessions of the annual Dauphin county Sabbath School convention, held in the Reformed Salem Church. Dr. Prugh spoke on "When We Vote as We Pray." He said that there would be a big decrease in suicides, crimes and accidents caused by intoxicated men, if the sale of alcoholic drink was stopped.

The Rev. Dr. William N. Yates, pastor of the Fourth Street Church of God, made a brief address on "Purity in Life." A. K. Morrison, temperance department superintendent, made his annual report in which he stated that the county received \$33,315 in revenue from the sale of intoxicating drink, and paid out \$186,000 each year for the care, cure, capture and punishment of drinkers and their victims.

REGISTRATION DAY IN M. E. CHURCHES

Ministers Throughout State Will Tell of Plans For Convention Here

During the past week over 1,200 letters have been sent to the Methodist ministers in the State asking them to speak and secure registrations for the Pennsylvania Convention of Methodist Men to be held in Harrisburg, November 20, 21, 22. It is expected that three thousand men, including bishops, general conference officers, general committeemen, district superintendents, ministers and twenty-five hundred laymen, will be present at the convention for the purpose of formulating a practicable and comprehensive denominational program and policy.

The registration fee of two dollars entitles the delegate to a seat in all sessions, to the delegates button and handbook and to all the privileges of a registered delegate. It is payable upon enrollment and to be sent to H. B. Dickson, convention secretary, 219 Walnut street, Harrisburg. The registration committee of the local churches began work last Sunday and prior to the 15th of the month. The Stevens Memorial Methodist Episcopal Church, of which Dr. Clayton Albert Smucker is pastor, was in the lead to complete the registration. The registration committee is a machinery that makes possible a great convention. In Harrisburg the Methodist men will be canvassed by seven special committees. Trade Unions Vote on Calling Monster Strike; 1 Dead, 34 Hurt in Crashes

New York, Sept. 16.—Several trade unions voted to-day for the purpose of determining their response to a call for a sympathetic strike to back up the striking street car employees. By Monday labor leaders expect to learn the sentiment of the longshoremen, teamsters, tidewater boat men, coal bargemen and stationary engineers and firemen to whom the carmen have particularly addressed their appeal. By Monday they assert, 70,000 men will be called out "to protect the very life of union labor in New York."

Constable Resigns Because Jury Acquitted Nephew

Wormleysburg, Pa., Sept. 16.—Constable John Stewart, of Wormleysburg has resigned his office on account of the Cumberland county court having acquitted his nephew, John Stewart, aged 19 years, of assault and battery. Young Stewart was arrested for assaulting his uncle, the constable, Burgess J. Fred Hummel and Justice of the Peace Coble.
