

PREPARE TO COPE WITH STRIKE MOBS

Policemen Placed at Strategic Points Along N. Y. Trolley System

New York, Sept. 22. — Repeated threats of a great general strike to help the striking street car employees caused all branches of the city government charged with enforcing the laws to prepare to-day for outbreaks of mob violence.

The police department told the traction companies that they could re-establish night service as soon as they were ready under assurance of adequate protection.

Vote on General Strike

Trade union leaders representing about 700,000 workers will meet this afternoon to decide whether to issue a call for a general strike.

The plan announced yesterday by M. J. Regan, of the State Board of Arbitration and Mediation, to enforce arbitration was temporarily abandoned today and the hearings which he announced would be held Monday have been postponed.
