Mr. Boyd is a member of the Princeton University branch of the American Red Cross motor ambulance corps. In military circles it is said the young members of this corps will probably be decorated for gallant services.

Berlin, Sept. 28.—The great Poniatowski bridge across the Vistula at Warsaw which was destroyed by the Russians when they evacuated the city in August, 1915, has been rebuilt. The bridge was re-opened in the presence of General von Beseler, the German Governor General.

Man Dies of Starvation on Eve of His Wedding  
Portland, Ore., Sept. 28.—A victim of illness, due indirectly to a summer of mountain climbing activity, Harley H. Prouty, ex-president of the Mazamas, and a brother of G. H. Prouty, ex-Governor of Vermont, died suddenly at St. Vincent's Hospital of practical starvation on the eve of his wedding day, his engagement being only recently announced.  
Another brother, C. A. Prouty, is ex-chairman of the Interstate Commerce Commission and is now director of valuations for that body. Mr. Prouty was one of the most expert mountaineers in the United States.  
He was taken ill during the second week on a recent trip here and forced to leave camp. At MacKenzie Bridge he fainted twice and rapidly thereafter continued to fall. He was taken to St. Vincent's Hospital. Death was due to complications of stomach and heart troubles.
