NEW RESERVOIR IS PLAN OF BOWMAN

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 year should net from \$10,000 to \$15,000 additional. With \$100,000 or \$125,000 available Mr. Bowman thinks he can safely proceed with the contemplated reservoir plans.
 The present Oak Knob tank is of

only a million gallons capacity and when built, was designed to furnish only the Thirteenth ward and other high points in the city which could not obtain the proper pressure by the old method. The increasing service naturally has decreased the pressure.
 Want Better Pressure
 Thirteenth ward residents and property owners living in other higher sections of the Hill have been persistent of late, in petitioning Mr. Bowman for better pressure. Only a few days

ago he visited some of the chief complainants with George Coughlin, his efficiency man, and tested out some of the spigots.
 The changes on Oak Knob have been contemplated for some months, a lack of funds only preventing the start of the project. With the clearing off of the water debt the financial obstacle to the proposed changes is removed.
 In addition to insuring better and much-needed pressure for the higher sections of the city, the larger reservoir will protect generally the entire city's water supply because the facilities for circulation will be vastly improved.

To Supply Whole Hill
 "We'll be able, with a new reservoir on Oak Knob, not only to serve the people in the Thirteenth ward and other high points more adequately but to supply the entire Hill," said Commissioner Bowman. "Furthermore, our service generally will be vastly improved. As the situation is to-day, our water supply would be

seriously threatened if a break in any of the big mains would occur and there should be trouble of some kind at the pumping station which would prevent pumping the water directly into the mains.
 "The chances for such trouble simultaneously are remote, of course, but there is always the possibility. I doubt if under such conditions, Harrisburg's water supply in the present reservoir would last more than three days. What we should have is a reserve supply and this is what a new high service reservoir would provide.
 Present Reservoir Holds 27,000,000
 "Our present old reservoir has a capacity of 27,000,000 gallons, but that was built twenty-five or thirty years ago. The city has grown wonderfully in that time and the water needs have been growing accordingly.
 "Could you build a 30,000,000 to 35,000,000-gallon plant on Oak Knob?" Mr. Bowman was asked.
 "Why not? To my mind, the present high service station should have been larger originally. But there is plenty of room up there."
 For Closed Top?
 "What about the type of construction? Would the new reservoir be closed as is the present one?"
 "The new one should be constructed of concrete and as for the type, I don't know but what the present system of a closed top could well be followed. The theory is, of course, that the water's best purifier is the combination of air and sunlight and while this is true, in some places the covered reservoir has been found to be equally satisfactory. Our tests of water from the high service station are better really, than the samples taken from the old one. However, I'm collecting data now on the subject and will be able to go into the problem pretty thoroughly as soon as I can get together all the information I wish."

will again return there in a short time. Contract for the first section of the railroad has already been awarded and work is now under way.
 This first spur will run between Santa Cruz, in the shadow of Moro Castle, to Jibico and Cnasi a distance of about 30 miles. The cost of this operation will be approximately \$500,000.
 At Cnasi there is located a large sugar mill recently purchased by Mr. Hershey and it is the plan to construct the first line to this sugar mill so that the annual output of the mill, some 50,000 bags of sugar, each weighing 50 pounds, may be transported to the water at a lower cost.
 Just as soon as this first spur is completed work will be started on the remainder of the line which will connect the towns of Minas, Florida, Jibico, Cnasi, Corral Nuevo and Matanzas.

While this railroad is being constructed Mr. Hershey plans to have built another larger sugar mill between Jibico and Santa Cruz. This new mill will have an initial capacity of 100,000 bags of sugar each season and provision will be made for increasing this capacity to 200,000 bags if needed. The mill will cost about \$1,000,000.
 The expenditure necessary to complete the entire Cuban project will approximate nearly \$5,000,000 over a period of a number of years.
