Raided Sportsmen's Club Got \$200,000 in 18 Months

Chicago, Oct. 4.—Funds collected in Chicago through the Sportsmen's Club of America on the strength of its reputed influence with Mayor William Hale Thompson reached a total of \$200,000 in eighteen months. Assistant State's Attorney Berger announced yesterday. These figures were computed from records seized in a raid on the club yesterday. The money was collected, Mr. Berger charged, through the installation of slot machines in Chicago and selling life memberships in the club at \$100.
