PAUL IN GRIP OF GREAT TESTING

Was Sorely Tried; Arrested and Thrown Into Prison

"God's ways are dark. But soon or late They touch the shining Hills of day."

Severest of all testings is that of endurance. It is hard to "Be still and know that I am God." The Psalmist, who continually exhorted "wait on the Lord," knew wherein men needed strengthening. The hero of the present course of lessons, Paul of Tarsus, found himself in the grip of a great testing. He who had been a prisoner and wait and wait and wait. A sore trial was this, to the man, who, above all other men, had a clear vision of the world's urgent need. That his roving ministry should be arrested in the very midst of his power, and he be clapped into a Roman prison, seems a strange providence. No wonder he needed a special vision and message from his Lord to fortify him for it.

As we tarry in the court of Felix, before this new trial of the apostle begins, let us recall, by provision, a few factors which help us to perceive the providences in Paul's case. The arrest and imprisonment of the great missionary is clearly an event of magnitude, for one-fourth of the Book of the Acts is devoted to it. This simple fact does more to impress the importance of the current lessons than any amount of exhortation. The arrest meant ultimate arrival at Rome, when Paul should stand at the center of the known world and hold aloft the cross. The Graftor on the Bench
There were many kinks and crooked places in this strange new trail that was leading Paul to Rome. It must have been hard for him to understand the fact that he had been hailed before this notorious grafter and lecher, Governor Felix. How often has it happened that the so-called stand trial before the sinner! Not seldom has innocence been placed at the bar of guilt. No evil in the organized life of man is more revolting than the fact that so often men of unclean personal life, and of corrupt professional practices, are elevated to the judiciary. Even the bar association of our day are openly considering this evil, so deep in the popular resentment against it. Yet in the Orient of old, as often to-day, the judge was shamelessly dishonorable, merchandising his decisions to the highest bidder.

This man Felix was a notorious grafter—so infamous that he was recalled by Rome, at the protest of the Jews. His private life was on a par with his judicial practices. Even the Roman historian Tacitus records his infamy and cruelty. He was an old man at the time of Paul's trial, who he had recently seduced the child-wife of the King of Emesa and murdered her third wife. This Drusilla, who had abandoned her lawful husband for the did rake Felix, was the daughter of Herod Agrippa the First. She was but a child when she listened to Paul of Tarsus. Her fate it was to be buried with her child in the ruins of Pompeii.

In the light of the immoralities of Felix, is it any wonder that when, at his second hearing, before both Felix and Drusilla, Paul dealt with the subject of justice, self-control, and the judgment that was soon to come.

Felix became alarmed and cried, "For the present, leave me, and when I can find a convenient opportunity I will send for you." The preacher made his hearer squirm. Evil always writes in the presence of truth. And like most who profess to wait for a more convenient season, Felix was cloaking his real reason for fleeing from truth and duty; he was a grafter, and hoped that this influential prisoner had friends who would come forward with a bribe. There never came a "convenient season" for Felix. The word for him and us was "To-day, if ye will hear His voice, harden not your hearts."

An Old-time "Frame-up"
In political circles there is a colloquial phrase "frame-up," which means a conspiracy to convict an innocent person. On this occasion, Paul was the victim of a "frame-up" to secure Paul's conviction. All the modern questions concerning the ethics of the legal profession come to mind as we listen to Tertullus. Then, as now, there was no cause so bad that it could not hire a lawyer to defend it. Then, as now, the nullification of law and justice rested its hope in a high-priced lawyer. By his oath, a lawyer is an officer of the court, sworn to uphold justice; and the lawyers who have nobly fulfilled their pledge are an ornament to the nation.

Tertullus, however, was not of this kind. He secured Paul's conviction, as fulsome as it was false. Compare the way in which he eulogized Felix with the perfectly polite but perfectly unskillful securing Paul's conviction, against the prisoner were mostly half-truths, which are ever the deadliest kind of lies. Had Paul been, like most prisoners, ignorant of the law and unskilled in pleading, he would have been convicted on the spot. The new social conscience of our day concerning the prisoner is a notable evidence of how the spirit of Him who came to set the captives free is permeating the world.

A Dungeon as a Pulpit
"A dungeon may become a pulpit when it is occupied by a prophet of the Lord," says Dr. Charles R. Brown, in The Congregationalist. Paul before Felix gives an illustration of how even adversity and injustice may become a pinnacle from which the truth may be preached. For ages we call attention to the fact that, as ever, Paul's defense was more a witness to his

Lord than a defense of himself. "Behold, how these Christians die!" has been the wonder-cry of all persecutions. The way in which saints endure trials has been one of the weapons of the Spirit's war. Without bitterness or fear or panic, Paul once more faced his fate, a witness to the power of the risen life.

Late summer, before the Loung Women's Conference at Northfield, George Sherwood Eddy read a letter that was written by one of the Shansi missionaries the night before he died in the Boxer massacres. Her husband had been beheaded, and her little children, her immediate family and all her associates, had perished. Her turn to feel the headsman's sword was only a few hours distant. This is her dying testimony, written to her family in America, and "I am very grateful to you for the message smuggled through. The letter's words with the spirit of Paul, the prisoner: "My dear, dear ones, I have tried to gather courage to write to you once more. How can I tell you the terrible details of these days? I would rather spare you. The dear ones at Shansi, including our lovely daughters, were taken prisoner and were held in the most degrading orders. We are now waiting our call home. I am preparing for the end very quietly and calmly. The Lord is wonderfully near. He will not fail me. I am very grateful to you for the message when there was a chance of life, but God has taken away that feeling, and now I pray for grace to meet the end bravely. The pain will soon be over, and, oh, the sweetest of all, I am above! My little baby will go with me, and I think God will give it to me in heaven. My dear mother will be so glad to see us. I cannot imagine the Saviour's welcome. Two that will compensate for all these days of suspense. Dear ones, live near to God; cling less closely to earth. I would like to send a special message to each one of you, but I am so tired, I must keep calm and still these hours. I do not regret coming to China; but I am sorry I have done so little."

Thrilling is the testimony of Christians in crises to the essential things of their faith. Paul reached the heart of his argument before Felix when he cried, "The resurrection of the dead before you to-day." He had an eye for essentials. No questions of personal well-being could divert him from the one thing—his faith in Christ's witness. Before magistrates and mobs, courts and crowds, he ever bore the one testimony.

With it all, Paul was a gentleman. He matched in courtesy the courtliest men he met. The pious boor gets no support from Paul. Rough and rude Christians, who mistake bad manners for independence and uncouthness for genuineness, run counter to his practice and teaching. The graciousness of the prisoner's address to Felix was limited only by the lines of truth. The temptation of the polite person is to be insincere; Paul told the truth, but told it pleasantly. This point of the lesson is worth developing, for the charge often made by the older nations against us young people is that we are too direct, that we are too plain, that we are too perfect gentlemen, Jesus of Nazareth, were complete gentlemen.

Aside from telling his story, the prisoner made one telling point in his own defense: "I also exercise myself to have a conscience void of offense, toward God and men always." The picture is drawn from athletics. He kept himself "fit" by training. He had been a spiritual athlete, in good standing. He had the rare foresight to see that some day, as is the case with every living man, his character would be his defense. All his future would be staked upon his past. So he came up to his testing with a clean

record. Ah, if youth could but learn that lesson!

There is an old story of a Scotch soldier who was one night found outside the lines. He was accused of having gone off to give information to the enemy. His defense was that he had merely retired into the woods to pray. The general before whom he had been brought was a shrewd man, and he said, "Well, you have five minutes more in which to pray, for traitors must be shot. Get down on your knees and pray aloud." The old Scot without a word began his prayer to God; and so intimate, so compelling, so trustful, was his supplication that in a minute or two the general cried, "Enough! You are free. No man can perform like that on parade who has not been long at drill. You are no traitor, but a praying man." A lifetime of familiar prayer had rushed to the vindication of the old soldier. So Paul's past crowded to his help in this hour of need. He was in training; therefore he won in the trial.


