



BOSTON TRIMS BROOKLYN IN FIRST GAME OF BATTLE FOR BASEBALL HONOR 6-5

Ideal Weather Conditions Make Opening Game of World Series at Boston Fast and Snappy; Players of Both Teams in Fine Fettle; Marquard and Shore Opposing Pitchers

Braves Field, Biston, Oct. 7.—The Boston American's triumphed over the Brooklyn Nationals in the first game of the world's series here this afternoon by a score of 6 to 5.

Marquard started in the box for Brooklyn but his defense completely crumbled in the seventh inning when a couple of errors and a hit gave Boston three runs and a safe lead.

The mass of people who swarmed through the broad reaches of Braves Field chosen as the stage for the local games because of its tremendous seating capacity.

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
