Disease-Breeding Virus Left at German Legation

Bucharest, Oct. 10.—An investigation made at the German legation has led to the discovery of numerous cases of trinitrotoluene buried in the garden of the legation, and of flagons labeled "virus" which was intended to propagate simultaneously an epidemic among men and horses, according to an official statement.

A representative of the United States legation witnessed the discovery, the statement continues. This new criminal German maneuver reveals preparations similar to those made in other countries. The Germans were unable to use their high explosives against works of art, as they were surprised by Rumania's entry into the war and by the surveillance of the secret police.

PRICE OF BREAD BOOSTED 20 PER CENT. IN ALTOONA

Altoona, Pa., Oct. 10.—The high cost of living in this city was given another boost when the retail price of bread was advanced 20 per cent. to the consumer. Five-cent loaves hereafter will sell for 6 cents. A few grocers have raised to 7 cents.

Several bakers have increased the 10-cent loaf to 12 cents and others are expected to follow suit in a few days. Wholesalers now are charging 1 cent a loaf more than formerly.

SHOCKED BY 13,600 VOLTS, HAS BURNS AN INCH DEEP

Reading, Pa., Oct. 10.—Touching a wire charged with 13,600 volts, Ed Meinton, employed at the branch station of the Metropolitan Electric Company, was burned on the legs, arms and shoulders so badly that his escape from death is considered remarkable.

His first request on reaching a hospital was for a cigarette, which he smoked while surgeons were dressing burns an inch deep in his flesh. He has a chance to recover.

TROOPS PASS THROUGH

Three sections, bearing the Third Regiment, Pennsylvania Infantry, en route from Camp Stewart, El Paso, to Philadelphia, passed through the city late last night and early this morning.

The first section arrived shortly after 10 o'clock and pulled out about a half-hour later; the other two sections followed within a few hours. The regiment is under the command of Colonel Charles T. Cresswell, who, with his staff, occupied Pullman cars on the first section.
