



### EARLY DON WINS BIG CIRCUIT RACE

Pulls Down Largest Purse of Week; Thrills Numerous at Lexington

Lexington, Ky., Oct. 11.—Split-heat races, all of which were hard fought, except the Ashland stake, which was won by Early Don, were the rule at the meeting of the Kentucky Trotting Horse Breeders' Association here yesterday. The 2:07 pace, carried over from

Monday, went two heats before it was finally won by the original favorite, Beth Clark. This race went six heats, which is the longest of the meeting. The 2:08 trot went five heats and had four heat winners. Peter Billiken, having won two heats, was declared the winner of the race under the rules. He was obliged to take a new record of 2:06½ in the third heat, while Pittsburg lowered his record to 2:06½ in the fourth heat. The 2:15 pace was unfinished at sundown, the Canadian mare, Queen Hal, having won the first two heats and Baron Wodd, from Michigan, the third. The principal race of the day was the Ashland stakes, worth \$200. Early Don, from the stable of Valentine, had little difficulty in winning in straight heats.

PENN'S NEW DROP KICKER Philadelphia, Oct. 11.—In the thirty-five-minute scrimmage between the Penn varsity and third varsity held yesterday afternoon on Franklin Field a new drop kicking star was uncovered in Harold Doering. During the contest between the two elevens, which ended in favor of the first eleven by a score of 13 to 6, Doering enabled the third varsity to tally against their teammates when he booted the pigskin over the cross-bar twice from the twenty-five-yard line. Doering played on the freshman eleven two years ago and was a member of the scrub last season. Besides scoring twice from the field Doering helped the members of the third varsity to hold off the varsity by his punting. He averaged close to fifty yards and placed the ball well, giving the ends and tackles a chance to get down the field.

BUCKNELL HAS CRIPPLES Lewisburg, Pa., Oct. 11.—The Bucknell football squad went through the first practice yesterday, since Saturday's game with Penn State. Mangan and Hendren were the only two men who were unable to report on account of injuries, the former having three broken ribs and the latter a fractured elbow. The afternoon's practice was devoted to signal plays and correcting faults found in Saturday's playing. Fifteen minutes before closing practice Coach Johnston called for scrimmage, in which the greater part of the varsity team took part. Saturday Bucknell will meet Susquehanna, and a lively contest is looked for by the local fans.

News Items of Interest in Central Pennsylvania Hazleton.—Receiving a 12 per cent. increase in wages, the 100 girls who struck at the Weatherly silk mill several weeks ago have agreed to return to work. Shamokin.—After an absence of forty-four years Mrs. John O'Conner arrived from Chicago, Ill., to attend the funeral of a relative. Hazleton.—Official figures of the city registration, secured to-day, show that there has been a falling off of over 600 during the year. Lansford.—George Boyle, chief of the fire department, and State Game Warden Boyle caused the arrests of John Bray and Harry Betherly, of Hazleton, charged with setting Bray's meat market on fire Monday night.

Berwick.—The congregation of Zwingle Reformed Church, of Berwick, now free of debt, has decided to erect a new church. Lancaster.—The Rev. George Hopkins Shea, pastor of the Octavora Presbyterian Church, was married last evening to Miss Florence Lanitz, of Bart, a member of his congregation. Reading.—A voluntary raise of \$1 a thousand has been granted the ninety cigarmakers in D. F. Fleck's cigar factory. The raise is double the amount the employees were about to ask. Reading.—Wheat has advanced to \$1.40 a bushel in Berks county. E. S.

Wertz, a Reading miller, predicts that it will go to \$2 in a month. Easton.—The congregation of St. Mark's Reformed Church has extended a call to the Rev. Allen S.
