He has written with the force and character of a big man and with the delicacy of a woman. It is not so much the things which he has left unsaid, that will cause his audience to think and ponder and philosophize.

Burton Holmes, whose series of five trilogies will open in this city, at the Orpheum Theater, about the middle of November, has lectured on European countries in former seasons, but has never devoted a time to the three great European Empires, Great Britain, Germany and France.
