PROFITS FROM TWO-ACRE FARM

Lutheran Minister of Milton Clears \$216 From Crops Raised During Season

HAY AND VEGETABLES

Large Quantities of Potatoes, Corn, Onions, Beans and Turnips

Milton, Pa., Oct. 21.—The Rev. Dr. J. M. Remensnyder, of Trinity Lutheran Church, cleared \$216 from two acres of ground, he farmed at his summer bungalow just outside the borough. A storm that leveled the corn crop, and some following dry weather lowered his profits some, he says but this was offset by the high prices he received for his vegetables. One of the two acres was in grass, in which four acres of hay was taken. On the other acre he raised twenty-six different products. He expended \$41.95 for plowing, fertilizer and labor and raised vegetables to the value of \$48.50, giving him profits from this acre of \$154.65. The hay he valued at the balance.

Among the products of this two-acre "farm" are: potatoes, 51 bushels; prime sugar corn, 2,240 ears; onions, 100 bunches; large onions, 3 bushels; lima beans, 20 quarts; turnips, 3 bushels; choice peaches, 3 bushels; sour cherries, 60 quarts; hundreds of bunches of radishes and many dozens of lettuce, besides cabbage, parsnips, pot corn, and other vegetables.
