troops of Prince Leopold, defending the approaches to Lemberg, have been repulsed, Berlin declares. It records heavy losses for the Russians in five successive assaults on the positions recently won by the Germans along the easterly bank of the Narayuvka. On the Somme front there has been a renewal of intense fighting. The French again exerted pressure near the points of the entente wedge into the German lines between Sully-Sailly and Les Boeufs, advancing last night, according to Paris, in the vicinity of the last-named place. Berlin records the failure of British attempts to advance along the miles-and-a-half line running northwest from Les-boeufs to Guedecourt and at Courcellette. The Germans were on the offensive at Sully-Sailly, but Paris reports they were defeated there in a violent engagement. In Macedonia, on the Struma front northeast of Saloniki, British troops have pushed further into the Bulgarian lines, capturing the village of Barakli-Azma, according to Paris to-day.

## Repopulating France Is Now the Problem of Reawakened French

Paris, Nov. 1.—The repopulation problem is passing from theory to practical effort in reawakened France. Sociologists, savants and scientists had for years before the war pointed out the dangers of a declining birth rate. Nothing was done, however, beyond the appointment of legislative commissions that never reported and, so far as the general public was concerned, it does not seem the danger was realized until the Germans made it real and operative at Charleroi by sending against the left wing of the allied armies masses of troops sufficient to overwhelm them. Heroin, aided by different circumstances, prevailed against superior numbers in the battles of the Marne and Nancy. At the outbreak of the war the Ger-

mans were in the proportion of 133 to 100, but in another twenty years the proportion would have been 300 to 100 in the natural rate of progression. This meant that the Germans had each year 550,000 recruits against 200,000, while in twenty years they would have had 900,000 to 300,000 or less.

These figures were known before the war, but they seem to have attracted the attention of scientists only. It remained for battles to impress their full significance upon more practical minds. To-day business men and business associations, agricultural syndicates, chambers of commerce and leaders in all walks of life have taken the question up. All that had been done previous to the war was the granting by law in 1890 of a free scholarship in one of the colleges to one of seven children of the same family. It is now generally admitted that it is the first three or four that should be encouraged. That is the subject of the proposed law recently introduced in the chamber of deputies by M. Paul Beneset, deputy for the Department of the Indre. It provides a premium of 500 francs (\$100) for each of the first and second children, 1,000 francs for the third and 2,000 francs for the fourth, and 1,000 francs for each succeeding child. This will not be a powerful incentive to the rich, but it will be a boon to the poor.

## REPUBLICANS TO HOLD BIG RALLY

Politicians to Parade Over the Principal Streets Before Meeting in Standard Theater

Steelton Republicans will rally in the standard theater to-morrow evening. Among the speakers will be William Swope of Clearfield; Congressman A. S. Kreider, Senator E. E. Beldiman, Ira Ush, of Millersburg, and David Bechtold, of Steelton. The last two are candidates in the county for Legislature.

Prior to the mass meeting in the theater a large number of politicians will parade through the principal streets of the town. The procession, headed by the Steelton Band, will move down Front to Chambers; up Chambers to Second, to Adams, to Front, to the theater and disperse. Preparations are being made to accommodate a large crowd at the theater.

## Announce Members of New Austrian Cabinet

Amsterdam, via London, Nov. 1.—The Vienna "Zeitung" publishes an autograph letter from Emperor Francis Joseph to Dr. Ernst von Koerber, the new Austrian premier, appointing the following cabinet: Minister of Justice, Dr. Franz Klein; Minister of National Defense, General Baron F. von Seinerl; Minister of Education, Baron Husarsak; Minister of Public Works, Baron Trinka; Minister of Interior, Baron Schurzeman; Minister of State, Governor Fobzanski; Minister of Commerce, Dr. Franz Strzal; Minister of Finance, Herr Karl Marek; Minister of Communications, General Ernst Schiele; Minister of Agriculture, Count Clamantini.

## Balfour Admits Loss of 9 Ships in Channel

London, Nov. 1.—The loss of six drift net boats in addition to the sinking of the transport Queen and the torpedoed destroyer Flirt, in the recent raid by German submarines in the English Channel, was admitted by A. J. Balfour, First Lord of the Admiralty, in the House of Commons. The torpedoed destroyer Flirt, he said, was surprised in the darkness by German destroyers, which fired on her at close range and sank her. The destroyer Nubian, torpedoed while attacking the German squadron, could have been brought to harbor the First Lord asserted, but for the gale.

## AUSTRALIANS RESIGN

Melbourne, via London, Nov. 1.—The resignations of Albert Gardiner, vice-president of the executive committee, and A. J. Russell, assistant minister of marine, and M. Higgs, minister of the treasury, have been accepted.

A dispatch to Reuter's Telegram Company, of London, from Melbourne under date of October 27, said that Messrs. Gardiner, Russell and Higgs had tendered their resignations, owing to their opposition to conscription.

## RAISE MILK IN STEELTON TOO?

Dealers Will Meet at Oberlin Tonight to Consider Raise

Dairymen of Steelton, following the move of milk dealers in Harrisburg have called a meeting to be held to-morrow evening in the fire engine house at Oberlin where they will discuss the advance in the wholesale price of milk decided upon by the producers.

It is understood that the producers in Lauphin and Cumberland counties will charge the advanced price of 18 cents a gallon not only to city dealer, but also to dairymen in boroughs and smaller towns. Steelton dealers expecting an increase in wholesale price are planning, if necessary, to advance the retail price. At present milk is selling at 7 cents in the borough, with a few dealers charging six cents. Whether a raise will be necessary will be decided at the meeting to-morrow night.
