### C. Howard Lloyd Plans New Front Street Home For David E. Tracy

Plans are being prepared by Architect C. Howard Lloyd for the handsome new residence of David E. Tracy, president of the Harrisburg Pipe and Pipe Bending Company which is to be built next year at Front and Muench streets. Work, it is expected, will be started early in the Spring. The residence will front for 115 feet in Front street and will have a depth of 220 feet in Muench. A feature of the sketches is the beautiful lay-out of the grounds. In front of the building will be a spacious terrace while in the rear a smaller terrace will lead upon the formal gardens. These will be of the "sunken" type to some extent and will occupy the major portion of the lot. A portico will cover the driveway leading in from Muench street.
