TWO BOY HUNTERS SHOT BY COMRADE

GENERAL LEE'S POCKET COMB

Waynesboro, Pa., Nov. 2.—The Rev. F. F. Bahner, D. D., pastor of the Reformed School Church at Zullinsler, and of Trinity Reformed Church, Waynesboro, has been presented with a pocket comb that was the property of that noted Confederate General Robert E. Lee. The comb was given to Norman Funk, of Zullinsler, 53 years ago by General Lee, while the Confederate army was retreating from Gettysburg, after the great battle in July, 1863. He and members of his staff stopped at the home of Mr. Funk, near Hagerstown and ate supper.
