### Alpha Club Eats Supper Before Result Is Known

Waynesboro, Pa., Nov. 9. — So ardent was he in the belief of Charles Evans Hughes' election, Mendie Kirsch, a native of Baltimore, and a merchant here, agreed to treat the members of the Alpha club, an organization he belonged to, to a roast chicken supper at one of the local hotels, if Mr. Hughes was elected. After he had received the news that Mr. Hughes had defeated President Wilson, Mr. Kirsch set about preparing for the feast and made arrangements with the hotel proprietor to serve the supper. Later reports appeared to show Wilson was the winner—but too late for Mr. Kirsch to cancel the supper contract. Twenty-five young men enjoyed the Hughes supper at Mr. Kirsch's expense.

### \$50,000 Paving Case Lost by Pottsville

Pottsville, Pa., Nov. 9.—A decision rendered from Justice Kephart of the Superior Court, finally decides that property owners of Market street, this city, need not pay \$50,000 charged against them by the city for paving with wood blocks. Justice Kephart declared that as Market street was macadamized before being paved with the wood blocks this must be considered an original paving. The city, therefore, cannot collect from the property owners the price of a second paving. Every third class city in the State is bound by the decision and a number of suits are pending on the same issue.

### Election Bonfire Endangers Business Section of Town

Waynesboro, Pa., Nov. 9. — Several large buildings in town came near being destroyed on election night in the heart of the business district from a fire started near a large storage house by boys in celebration of the election. A number of large boxes had been saturated with gasoline and a match had been applied. The storage house, together with the Daily Herald newspaper plant and the handsome new Arcade theater building, were in danger.

### CLERKS COUNT VOTE

Sunbury, Pa., Nov. 9. — With 18 clerks Judge Cummings, Judge Moser and Prothonotary Summers to-day started the work of making the official count of the vote in Northumberland county on Tuesday. More than 16,000 votes were cast. Northumberland for a dozen years has held the reputation of being the first county to get its returns to the State Department at Harrisburg.

She was 17 years old and was a senior in the Millerstown high school. She is survived by her parents, three sisters, Della, a nurse of Trenton, N. J.; Lena and Mrs. Thomas Nankivil, and seven brothers, Max, of Jersey Shore; Edward, Charles, Frank, Norman, Rodney and Ernest. Funeral services will be held to-morrow afternoon at 2 o'clock. The Rev. C. F. Himes of the Methodist Episcopal Church, will officiate.
