RUMANIAN ISSUE AGAIN HANGING IN THE BALANCE

Allies Are Driving on Constanta-Tchernavoda Railroad With Success

FIGHTING FOR BRIDGE

Bitter Battle Raging Again Along Somme; Entente Winning

The issue in the Rumanian province of Dobrudja, where the Russo-Rumanian forces are apparently attempting to regain possession of the Constanta-Tchernavoda railroad line, seems again to hang in the balance.

Russo-Rumanian troops are advancing from the north upon Field Marshal von Mackensen's left flank at Tchernavoda and other entente forces are close to the town along the route of the twelve-mile-long bridge and viaduct which spans the Danube and carry the railroad across the extensive marsh lands west of the main stream.


Official Returns of Guard Vote Brought to City

WILL NOT CONCEDE WILSON'S ELECTION UNTIL AFTER COUNT

Willcox Holds to Belief That Race Will Be Decided Only by Certified Returns; McCormick Coming Here; Democratic Headquarters Closed

Race Closing Up in New Hampshire; Hughes Has Plurality in Minn.; No Split Vote in California; Complexion of Next Congress Worrying Wilson

New York, Nov. 11.—With Republican National Chairman Willcox still awaiting the official count in close states before conceding the defeat of Charles E. Hughes in the national election, the latest returns to-day in the close states of California, Minnesota, New Mexico and New Hampshire still presented on their face no change affecting the President's majority in the electoral college.

HOLDS UP HOLDUP MAN

DEUTSCHLAND TIED TO PIER

New London Conn. Nov. 11.—The German undersea merchantman Deutschland, ready to proceed to sea for its return voyage to Germany was still tied up at the state pier, under shelter of the steamer Willehad, this forenoon. There were no signs of an immediate departure.

SIGHT WESTWARD BOUND U-BOAT

Norfolk, Va., Nov. 11.—Incoming British ships, according to water front reports last night, sighted a submarine 150 miles off the Virginia Capes, Thursday, moving westward. Observers did not get near enough to say whether the submersible, apparently of German build, was a merchantman or a fighting craft.

RUSSIAN ATTACKS FUTILE

Berlin Nov. 11.—By Wireless.—Russian forces yesterday tried in vain by the use of strong new forces to recapture the position stormed by us the day previous at Skrolowa near Baranovichi. All the attacks broke down under heavy losses, says to-day's German official statement. German troops penetrated the main Russian positions southwest of Folv-Krasnolesis, the statement adds and repulsed five violent counterattacks launched at night.

VILLA IN PARRAL AND SANTA ROSALIA

Eagle Pass Tex. Nov. 11.—Defacto government troops under General Murgua have recaptured Parral and Santa Rosalia according to a report received here to-day. This report said a message signed "Murgua" stating these towns were recaptured was received last night.
