FOREST FIRES TO BE DISPLAYED

Commonwealth Using Films to Demonstrate Destruction of State Woods

"The Curse of the Forest," the motion picture of a forest fire taken on the Mont Alto State forest, has been booked for three showings in the Cumberland valley. It will be shown November 25 at the Scotland school; November 28 at Mercersburg, and November 30, Thanksgiving Day, at Waynesboro.

The picture is in two and one-half reels, and is one of the best forest fire pictures ever filmed. It was taken by the Vitagraph Company of America in co-operation with the Pennsylvania Department of Forestry.

Present Pennsylvania forest fire conditions are contrasted in the picture with conditions we might have if adequate funds were available. Not a single scene of the picture is faked, and every foot of it, with the exception of one office scene, was taken on the State forests.

Development and method of fighting a forest fire, with the desolation which follows in its wake. It also shows the modern methods by which many forest fires could be prevented, and the loss from others reduced to a minimum.

Altogether, it is distinctly a Pennsylvania picture. The scenario and staging were arranged by the Department of Forestry, and all of the actors but one are men of the Pennsylvania Forest Service. It is an especially good picture for the children to see.

STATE'S MAP MEN PLOT BIG FOREST

Work in Juniata Valley Is Being Pushed by Conklin's Surveying Force

According to a report which reached the Capitol to-day, the State's official map makers have been doing some notable work up the Juniata valley. A strip of almost solid forest, approximately fifty-five miles long and from two to eight miles wide, has been covered by topographers of the Forest Service in the most accurate survey of Pennsylvania forests ever made.

The purpose of the surveys is to secure data on which to base plans for the future development of the State forests. The areas surveyed are being made up as rapidly as possible, and show every detail of topography, springs, roads, trails, fire lines, streams, camp sites and elevations.

The surveys will be continued until the whole million acres of State forest have been covered. As soon as they are made up, small scale copies will be placed on sale at nominal prices. The only maps available now are for the Berks Forest, Huntingdon county. Others have been most completed for the following forests: Bear Meadows, Greenwood, Seven Mountain, Penn. Jack's Mountain, Buffalo, Kishacoquillas and Pennypacker.
