

GOVERNOR SEES PENN MOVIES

State Officials Attend Private View of Easton Celebration at Majestic

No doubt lay in the minds of anyone who saw the William Penn Highway Easton film at the Majestic theater this morning that there were over a thousand automobiles in the parade of cars which carried visitors to the scene of the dedication of the New York Extension at Easton November 2.

The first part of the Easton film shows a "bad" road. It is a piece of worn-out macadam, rutty and full of miniature lakes. The trouble machines and horse-drawn vehicles have in negotiating such a road is visualized. Then comes the new concrete straightaway, eight miles in length, connecting Bethlehem and Easton.

The William Penn Highway next week begins the showing of its Easton films throughout Pennsylvania. Prior to the showing of the 1,950 feet exhibited for the first time this morning there will be screened 1,200 feet showing the actual construction work on the Easton-Bethlehem highway. This film was to have been shown the Governor to-day, but the messenger failed to arrive from Worcester, Mass.

Naval Program For 1918 Costliest in U. S. History

Washington, Nov. 21. — While Secretary Daniels was awarding contracts yesterday for armorplate, the appropriation subcommittee of the House Naval Committee began work on the 1918 estimates, the heaviest in American history, to be presented to Congress this winter.

The Navy Department's 1918 figures contemplate construction of half of the ships yet to be built in the great three-year program, and show total appropriations of \$379,151,701, or more than \$400,000 in excess of the record total appropriated last summer.
