Lewisberry, Pa., Dec. 16.—The District of Columbia Signal Company has been ordered back to Washington, but will not be home by Christmas, although they may be on their way.

They left Washington, D. C., on July 25 for Bismarck, Ariz., and were later sent to Nogales, Ariz. The company has just returned from a hike to Tucson, Ariz., where they camped and were elaborately entertained by the Chama.

On the road we bought canned beans and stuff at Tobac; I think that was the name of the place. Only a half dozen adobe brick houses, flat roofs, miserable place. Something like I would expect to see in Mexico.

We had to travel fast in order to make a watering place by night. First night we camped at a river. There was only a little water running in it, but it was clear and like spring water. We drank it as well as did the horses.
