Marine Insurance Jumps on Reports of Commerce Preyers in Atlantic

New York, Dec. 30.—Marine insurance rates to-day showed a further increase. Underwriters quoted an increase of 10 per cent. for insuring cargoes bound to ports of the United Kingdom and 10 per cent. to Mediterranean ports.

The advance was attributed to reports that the Lamport & Holt liner Voltaire, long overdue, had been captured by a German prize crew and was preying on allied freighters in the North Atlantic and to the fact that several transatlantic steamers are now overdue on both sides of the ocean.

Although the Voltaire, from Liverpool to New York, is fourteen days behind her schedule, representatives of the line here said that they had not given up hope "should not do" until they heard officially that their vessel had been lost.

Thousands Perish When Russian Transport Hits Mine Insecurely Anchored

Failure of Conference Will Have No Effect

Washington, D. C., Dec. 30.—Chairman Newlands, of the Senate interstate commerce committee, said to-day that failure of railroad brotherhood officers to reach an agreement regarding an eight-hour schedule pending determination of the constitutionality of the new law, would have no effect on plans for consideration of railroad legislation urged by President Wilson in his last message to Congress.

Maniac Shoots His Doctor and Duel With Police

Baltimore, Md., Dec. 30.—Barriaded in his home and armed with a heavy revolver, a 32-year-old man, who had been a county police at bay for nine hours, shot and killed a doctor and wounded Dr. George H. Hocking, his family physician, who was called early in the morning to attend him when he suddenly became a raving maniac.
