NICKEL SMOKE PASSING?

That 1917, in all probability, will bring an increase in the price of cigars, and possibly the passing of the "nickel-smoke," are predictions made by cigar manufacturers in Harrisburg and other nearby places, in reviewing the big increase in the cost of cigar production. Standard five-cent cigars may not advance, it was said, but an increase will be almost a necessity for local manufacturers, if the present quality is to be maintained. Increased cost of labor and cost of raising the tobacco are the principal reasons given in explaining the possibility of advancing prices.

In the marriage license bureau, for instance, just 127 more licenses were issued during 1916 than in 1915—1,441 as compared to 1,314. Eighty more deeds and mortgages were handled and the other business increased correspondingly to such an extent that Recorder Lentz will divide with the county the largest sum in excess fees that a recorder ever turned in.

Two such machines were installed during the past year. By adding this equipment the recorder has been able to dispense with the services of two transcriber clerks, J. H. Sheesley and Joshua W. Gross. Sheesley is a Lentz appointee; Gross has been a clerk in the recorder's office for more than fourteen years. Their resignations became effective to-day.
