



ENTIRE WORLD IS CONSIDERING WILSON'S LAST MOVE FOR PEACE

Congress and Diplomats Recovering From Amazement Start to Study Conditions Under Which President Believes U. S. Would Enter World League For Permanent Peace

LOOK TO EUROPE WITH PROFOUND INTEREST

Eagerly Awaiting Effect Pronouncement May Have on Warring Nations and, Also Verdict of American Public; Wilson Realizes Tremendous Opposition That Must Be Overcome Here

Washington, Jan. 23. — Congress and the diplomatic corps recovering somewhat from their bewildered amazement of yesterday, set themselves to-day deliberately and with varying emotions to consideration of President Wilson's notable address to the Senate...

The President asked the Senate for no action. He merely laid before the "counsel associated with" him in the final determination of the country's international obligations...

Copies Already Sent Abroad Copies of the address already are in the hands of American diplomats abroad for delivery to the "Foreign Offices of belligerents and neutrals, and upon the nature of its reception there may depend whether there is to be any further protracted discussion of peace in the immediate future...


Oil, Coal and Merchandise Dropped at Front Doors When Train Drops in Street

The crossing was effected near Tulcha, 38 miles southeast of Galatz, and places the Bulgarians apparently on one of the large islands which stud the course of the river near its mouth.

INTERNATIONAL EXPO IN PHILA. PLANNED FOR 1926

Resolution For Committee of Nine to Celebrate 150th Anniversary of Independence

A joint resolution providing for appointment by the Governor of a commission of nine to arrange for the holding of an international exposition at Philadelphia in 1926 in celebration of the 150th anniversary of American independence was introduced in the House to-day by Representative James A. Walker, Philadelphia. It carries an appropriation of \$10,000 for preliminary expenses.

GOVERNOR DECLARES BUREAU OF MARKETS IS BIG FARM NEED

Greatest Agricultural Gathering in History of Commonwealth Under Way; Big Show in Emerson-Brantingham Building Shows Finest Products of Pennsylvania

FIVE ASSOCIATIONS TO HOLD ANNUAL CONVENTIONS HERE DURING THE WEEK

State Agricultural Board, Breeders and Dairymen, Horticulturists, Veterinarians and Vegetable Growers Will Take Up Questions Relating to Their Various Fields

With the opening of the State Farm Show in the Emerson-Brantingham building, Tenth and Market streets, the convening of the State Board of Agriculture and the Pennsylvania Veterinary Medical Association this morning, and of the State Horticultural Association and Pennsylvania Vegetable Growers' Association this afternoon, the greatest agricultural gathering in the history of Pennsylvania is under way in this city.

FIRST TO DIE IN NEW HOSPITAL

Elizabethtown, Pa.—Martin G. Frank, for many years a building inspector in Pittsburgh, and for eleven years a member of Pittsburgh council, died at the Philadelphia Freemasons' Memorial Hospital here, from a stroke of apoplexy. He is the first to die in the new hospital.

NEW PUBLIC SERVICE BILL GOES IN

Harrisburg.—Senator Snyder of Schuylkill to-day presented a bill abolishing the present Public Service Commission, making the department a bureau of the Department of Internal Affairs with the Secretary of Internal Affairs as chairman.

TROOP RETURN TO START JAN. 26

San Antonio, Tex., Jan. 23.—The return of 25,000 National Guard troops ordered home from the border last Sunday will begin January 26 or 27. It is estimated a month will be required to complete the movement.

SPROUL RESOLUTION REPORTED

Harrisburg.—After an attempt to strike the immunity clause from Senator Sproul's resolution to investigate the Brumbaugh administration had been defeated, the Senate Appropriations Committee to which it was referred, voted to report it out and Senator Buckman, the chairman, is endeavoring to obtain unanimous consent to let it come out to-day.

SILK MILL BOOSTS WAGES

Harrisburg.—An increase in wages was announced to-day at the Harrisburg Silk Mill. Wages go up from 10 to 15 per cent. and the raise is in effect this week.

PRESENT LOCAL OPTION BILL

The local option bill, backed by the Anti-Saloon League, was presented in the House to-day by Representative John W. Vickerman, Allegheny. It provides for the county unit, an election to be held on petition of twenty-five per cent. of the voters of a district and no election to be held within three years.
