BULLER SAYS HE WILL GIVE REPLY

Will Be Ready With a Statement For the Legislature on McCall's Ferry Dam



Nathan R. Buller, State Commissioner of Fisheries, said today that he would send to the House within the next week or so an answer to the request for information on the highway controversy at McCall's Ferry dam, which Spangler resolution adopted this week.

Mr. Buller has gone to York to make some inspections and will attend the meeting of the executive committee of the National Fisheries Association at Baltimore.

Big Merger.—The Governor has approved the merger of the Marble Hill and Pennsylvania Lodge Building and Loan Associations of Philadelphia under the name of the Combined Building and Loan Association, with a capital of \$2,000,000.

To Meet Monday.—The Public Service Commission has adjourned to meet on Monday, when a number of hearings will be held.

To Ask Answers.—The jitney men against whom the Harrisburg Railways Company brought complaints for operating without certificates from the Public Service Commission will be asked to give answers to the charges. Hearings will probably be held.

Work Is Finished.—The State College engineers who have been here studying the Capitol power plant have finished their work and will go home to day.

Changes Begun.—The changes in the Senate chamber lighting and to tone down the green and gold decorations were started to-day by workmen under the direction of Mr. J. H. Oakley. They will be finished in a week. Frosted globes will be installed.

New Dye Company.—A charter has been issued to a new dyeing company to operate in Pittsburgh, experienced dye workers having started it. Abundant capital has been provided for it.

The Bank Call.—For years it was the custom of the State Banking Department to make public calls for statements of State banks, trust companies and savings institutions. This week admission that a call had been issued was made two days after it had been mailed. Some of the members of the Legislature have been called and calls for bank statements a fruitful subject of discussion to-day and something may be heard next week.

Not Much "Revolt".—Not much talk has been heard among members of either branch of the Legislature over a "revolt" against the recesses over the week-ends. The bulk of the members appear to be in the city and leave the matter to Speaker Baldwin notwithstanding some "hot air" which was printed to-day. The Speaker has shown a level head in dealing with unusual situation and his plans will work out smoothly and greatly to the dissatisfaction of the Democratic ring-masters.

State Has Money.—The State Treasury statement of January business shows a combined balance, on January 31, of \$4,955,975.69, against \$4,896,875.22 at the close of December. During January receipts were \$2,154,542.98 and expenditures \$2,105,442.52. The general fund balance is \$3,598,650.90, balances in other funds being: Stinking, \$85,110.02; school (uninvested), \$9,165.82; game protection, \$398,312.83; bounty, \$169,889.15; fire insurance (uninvested), \$98,604.85; prison labor manufacturing, \$30,242.11.

Schuykill Men Here.—Committees of Schuykill county men were here to-day to discuss the vacancy in the Schuykill county judgeship which the Governor is expected to fill at an early day.

Bids Opened To-day.—Bids were opened at the State Highway Department this morning for bituminous materials for use in maintenance work during 1917. The bids were read and ordered checked and it was announced that the successful contract would be notified later. For the purpose of bidding on bituminous material, the State was divided into four districts, geographically, these districts being the same as last year.

Bids were received from the following: Barrett Company, Philadelphia; The Good Roads Company, Baltimore; Atlantic Refining Company, Philadelphia; Headley Good Roads Company, Philadelphia; United Gas Improvement Company, Philadelphia; The Beam Fletcher Corporation, Philadelphia; Paul J. Snyder and Company, Philadelphia.

To Act Next Week.—The Public Service Commission will act next week in the contest for Philadelphia city street lighting which were submitted on Monday.

More Cases Turned Up.—More typhoid fever cases have appeared in the vicinity of Ocean Mills, and it is believed that the total number of cases will run up to 75. Commissioner of Health Dixon has detailed Chief Nurse O'Halloran and a number of nurses and inspectors to combat the disease. A temporary hospital has been established. The department has also received word of an outbreak of smallpox in a labor camp near Johnstown.

Lancaster Trustees Named.—Governor Brumbaugh to-day appointed the following trustees for the mothers' pension fund of Lancaster county: Mrs. W. N. Appel and Mrs. James D. Landis, Lancaster; Mrs. Belle Patterson Evans, Fuisis; Mrs. J. Hay Brown, Paradise, and Mrs. W. L. Bucher, Columbia.

Col. Patterson Named.—Col. William J. Patterson, of Pittsburgh, commander in chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, was to-day appointed to succeed the late A. P. Kinley as a member of the Meade Memorial Commission.

Complaint on Water.—Residents of Dallastown, York county, to-day entered complaint with the Public Service Commission against the rates of the York County Consolidated Water Company.

Dauphin Men Enlist.—The State Police to-day enlisted ten men to fill vacancies. One of them was M. S. G. Row, of Williamstown, who had served in the United States marine corps and the other Harold S. Bingham, of this city. The former goes to Greensburg troop and the latter to Pottsville.

COUNTY LAW MEN TO MEET FEB. 13

Will Act on Proposed Amendments on Tax Collection System in State

Amendments to laws providing for assessing property in counties and for collection of county taxes will be drawn up at a meeting of the law committee of the State Association of County Commissioners to be held here February 13 in the Grand Jury room in the courthouse.

Changes that are favored include raising commissions for county tax collectors from two to five per cent.; election of three county assessors for terms of four years instead of one for each township; the present system; elimination of clause ordering taxpayers for cities and having property owners pay taxes direct to the county treasurer's office.

File Equity Suit.—Equity proceedings were started to-day by the York Haven Water and Power Company, against the school district of Londonderry township, because taxes were levied on St. John's, Rush and Duffy's Island, located in the township. The islands are assessed at \$28,200. The company claims the property can not be taxed for school funds.

The destructive designs of our opponents cannot be expressed more strongly. We have been challenged to fight to the end. We accept the challenge, we stake everything, and shall be victorious.

MUMMERS WILL NOT GO BEGGING

Refuse to Hold Fantastic Parades if They Must Solicit Funds to Meet Expense

Fantastic New Year parades will not be held in the future under the direction of the Harrisburg Mummers' Association, unless money can be raised to finance the event without soliciting businessmen for funds.

Resolutions to this effect were passed last night by the association at the final meeting for the season of 1916-17, held in the offices of Walter L. Montgomery, Third and Chestnut streets. At the close of the meeting the following statement was made by members:

"We believe the annual Mummers' parade is growing into an institution of sufficient proportions to be a good thing for the city, but we do not feel that it should be financed by annual trips of solicitation to the business people of the city. While all of the money contributed for this year's celebration was contributed willingly, we appreciate that the merchants and other business people are called upon too frequently for donations, so that unless we can find a way to have the event financed in some other manner we have decided to drop it. There is no doubt but what each succeeding year would show improvement in the celebration, but after four successive years of being compelled to beg the money, the few men who have arranged each of these parades feel that it has gone far enough. In Philadelphia, the city itself appropriated \$7,500 to this year's Mummers' parade. An appropriation of \$1,000 in Harrisburg would assure a good celebration. But unfortunately it is explained that the city cannot, by law, make such an appropriation."

The finance committee reported all bills paid. The expense of the New Year's parade was \$755.40 which was raised by entrance fees and subscriptions.

5,000 MINERS GET RAISE

Charleston, W. Va., Feb. 1.—Five thousand miners in the Cabin Creek coal district will receive a 10 per cent. increase in wages beginning March 1, it was announced by the employing companies here to-day. The operators in making the announcement say the increase was given to offset the higher cost of living.
