Leak Hearings Will Be Resumed in Washington

New York, Feb. 2.—Hearings by the "leak" investigating committee will be resumed in Washington tomorrow morning at 10 a. m. Chairman Henry announced to-day, George A. Ellis, of E. T. Hutton and Company, who wrote the message warning brokers of the coming of the President's peace note, probably will be the first witness.

COMFORT STATION IN COURTHOUSE IS POSSIBILITY

County Commissioners Would Consider Idea if Other Plan Falls Through

Harrisburg's proposed public comfort stations may be placed under the courthouse with entrances at the side or front of the building, should City Council, the Planning Commission and officials of the Harrisburg and Valley Railways companies disagree on plans for building them in Market Square.

County Commissioners H. C. Wells, C. C. Cumber and Henry M. Stine in discussing the proposed rearrangement in Market Square unanimously agreed to consider placing the comfort stations under the courthouse, should other plans be disagreed upon. Commissioner Stine, who first made the suggestion said to-day: "The entrances to the comfort stations could easily be placed on each side of the courthouse, one on the Court street side, the other between the courthouse and the Commonwealth Trust building."

"It would probably be less expensive as the space would in all probability be given by the county without charge. As to the traffic conditions in Market Square, the proposed rearrangement has not considered making any suggestions. That is for the City Council to decide."

"In case plans for the comfort station in Market Square are not agreed upon, we will be willing to meet with the city authorities to consider placing the proposed improvements on the courthouse site."

Commissioner William H. Lynch, who was given authority to appoint an architect to make plans and give suggestions about the improvements, said to-day that he does not expect to name any one for at least two weeks. "I am communicating with officials in other cities where public comfort stations have been erected, to get estimates on what the cost of the improvement may be. Commissioner Lynch commented to-day in the course of the many plans that have been suggested. "When I ask Council's approval of my selection, I'm going to be sure it is some of the best human ideas in his mind. I don't want that. What is needed is some one to make a study of the whole thing and then to give us what he thinks is the best way to make the improvement."


