New York, Feb. 3.—The announcement by Fire Commissioner Bob Adamson, that fire prevention work is the chief factor in a remarkable reduction in tenement house fires, reminds me that newspaper men are playing a mighty important part in the success of the Mitchell administration.

Pittsburgh, Feb. 3.—Miss Cecelia McGirr, 80 years old, known among the children in the neighborhood of her home, on Elmwood street, North Side, as "The Witch," was found dying of starvation there yesterday. CHILD'S CRIBS SAVE 14 LIVES
Families Escape From Building as Fire Causes \$11,000 Loss
Shenandoah, Pa., Feb. 3.—A child's witness stand yesterday saved the lives of the fourteen members of the families of John McArigo, Lewis Uperberg and Jacob Condo, all of whom lived in the same building.
John McArigo, 8 years old, was the first of the inmates of the building to awake. Although almost suffocated by the smoke, he aroused his parents, who found the structure in flames. They awakened the occupants, who were compelled to flee in their night clothing. Everything in the building was destroyed. The loss is \$11,000.
