### BUCKMAN FAVORS MORE REVENUES

#### Senator Says That Commonwealth Must Increase Its Income at Once

Senator Clarence Buckman, chairman of the Appropriations Committee of the Senate, said at Doylestown last night, that new measures would be introduced into the present State Legislature to create additional revenues for this Commonwealth. According to Senator Buckman, the revenues of the State must be increased, from \$70,000,000 every two years to \$100,000,000 or more if the Commonwealth is to keep pace with proper appropriations for its institutions.

"Every institution in Pennsylvania receiving State aid," said Senator Buckman, "is asking for increased appropriations from the present Legislature over 1915. In some cases the amount asked for is double; in other instances more than double. The increased appropriations sought are on account of the high cost of living, and increased expense of maintenance and the exceptionally higher cost of labor."

"For a number of years the revenues of the State of Pennsylvania have remained the same. They have not been advanced. But now it is necessary to raise more money in order to keep our institutions in operation. Requests for appropriations this year total more than \$149,000,000, or double the present revenue of the Commonwealth. State College alone, the one big farm school supported by the State, has asked for appropriations totaling approximately \$2,500,000. On account of limited revenues, this appropriation cannot be granted."

### HIMSELF IF HIS PUPILS ARE FAILURES

In the American Magazine is an interesting article by Merle Crowell about the School of Engineering of the University of Cincinnati, where the students have to work with their hands in foundry and railroad yard at regular, paid jobs in order to graduate. The first aim of the University is to eliminate students and the school has probably a higher percentage of successful graduates than any other in the country. It is the idea of Dean Herman Schneider who said regarding it:

"If an earnest student with average brains is not a success we feel it is largely our fault. We have not by a long shot mastered the science of eliminating misfits. Sometimes it takes many months, many shifts of occupation to determine just what work a youth is best fitted to do. But when a co-operative student (one who alternates in classroom and shop work) remains with us two years we are able to guarantee that he will be a success in the job to which we assign him."

"Schneider's system was found abundant paper proof of this fact in the records of the university; but the practical affirmation came from the lips of Cincinnati manufacturers, contractors, operators, from the ranks of eighty industries which are co-operating with Schneider's school in the problem of making men efficient. It is the testimony of these employers of labor. Their testimony was enthusiastic and unanimous."

### HOW TO KEEP A GOOD COMPLEXION THROUGH LIFE

In the American Magazine Dr. Arthur R. Reynolds says:

"To maintain a good complexion through life, or to regain a lost complexion, it is necessary to eliminate all wastes of the body promptly. If daily production of waste is equal to the elimination of it, the body good complexion will be the rule and not the exception. The reason why all wastes are not promptly eliminated is because the right foods are not eaten. Eliminating cannot go on thoroughly unless the intestines are kept in a filled-up condition by eating food that leaves residue in the intestinal tube after digestion has done its part. Concentrated food leaves little or no residue. Every farmer knows that his live stock, in winter, needs to be fed what he calls roughage, that is, food that fills up the stomach and the intestinal tube. This filling up is necessary for stock; it is equally necessary for human beings."

### SNEEZING FATAL TO AVIATORS.

In the American Magazine is an account of Katherine Stinson, the girl flyer, from whose school in San Antonio, Texas, more than a hundred of Great Britain's army birdmen were graduated. Miss Stinson herself has performed the most difficult feat.

"When asked if she was afraid she might fall, she replied that sneezing was the only thing she feared. She declared that nine-tenths of the accidents in the air are caused by aviators losing control of their machines while sneezing."

"The aviator," says Miss Stinson, "passes through numerous strata of different temperatures. He often catches cold and sneezes violently. When you sneeze, for the moment you lose all control of yourself. If you do that while in the air your friends are going to gather up your remains."

### BELGIAN CHILDREN CONTINUE TO STARVE

In the American Magazine we read that the ration which the American Relief Commission in Belgium is able to give out is not sufficient for the children. Scientists have found that an extra meal of a biscuit made of flour, lard and a little sweetener, and a cup of cocoa with milk and sugar would keep the children almost normal. Such a ration would cost six cents a day, and the Belgians themselves, though greatly impoverished, will scrape together enough to pay half the cost of this single meal, but where the additional money will come from nobody seems to know. Apparently not from this country, for Americans have practically stopped giving to war charities.

### WORLD'S COPPER OUTPUT HAS BEEN DOUBLED BY ONE MAN

In the American Magazine is an interesting account of one of the most remarkable figures of the present industrial age, Daniel C. Jackling, who has evolved a scheme for the utilization of low-grade ore at a greater profit than is gained by the owners of the famous Michigan mines. It is needless to say that already Mr. Jackling is a multimillionaire.

"We can handle, at a profit, ore that contains only fourteen pounds of metal to the ton," he has stated of his mine at Bingham, Utah, "and we have several hundred millions tons of a far better grade fully developed and in reserve."

"This means that the available supply of copper—next to iron the world's most useful metal—has almost been doubled. Which, in turn, means that copper without the quantities made available through Jackling's work, would now be selling at a dollar instead of twenty-six cents a pound, would command a price, regardless of war conditions, that would seriously curtail the growth and expansion of the electrical industry."

For Jackling, once he had demonstrated the value of low-grade copper ore, did not confine himself to the development of the Bingham mountain. He went into Nevada, Arizona and New Mexico, obtained similar deposits and proceeded to develop them. This year the quarter of new copper mines under his control is producing nearly five hundred million pounds of the red metal, one third of all the copper mined in the United States, procuring the copper for less than nine cents a pound and selling it for more than twenty-five cents, thus leaving a surplus above cost of production of more than sixty million dollars in twelve months!

### HUNGRY SEPARATED FROM STARVING IN BELGIUM

To-day, according to a member of the Belgian Relief Commission who writes of conditions in Belgium in the American Magazine, they are separating the hungry from the starving in the breadlines. Children of normal weight are being removed, screaming, from the bread lines to make room for the emaciated. In Belgium and the part of northern France held by the Teutons are ten million people of whom more than a third are totally destitute.
