ELOQUENT TALK

ON PATRIOTISM

Officers Elected and Anniversary Exercises With Interesting Exhibits by Children

"America Will Lead World at Close of War—but What Will Lead America?"

The following officers were elected this morning at the annual meeting of the Children's Industrial Home: President, Mrs. Charles J. Rettew; vice-presidents, Mrs. Edward Boyer, Mrs. Catherine Milhouse, Mrs. Samuel Watts, Mrs. Edwin S. Herman; recording secretary, Miss Emma Bross; corresponding secretary, Mrs. Mercer B. Tate; treasurer, Mrs. Agnes Felix.

This afternoon anniversary exercises were held with a brief program, including singing, devotional services, led by the Rev. Mr. Leinbach, a talk by the Rev. Dr. Leinbach, song by Mrs. Joseph A. Hayes, songs and recitations by the children of the home.

The treasurer, Miss Agnes Felix, showed a balance of \$39.45 in the treasury after expenses amounting to \$26.54 had been paid. Both the state and the county have helped in the expenses of the home, which are necessarily heavy, and many private contributions have been received. The board of managers asks for a large membership at one dollar each, as well as other contributions.

Report of Secretary

As we look back over the past year's work of the Children's Industrial Home, we find few changes and that it differs very little from that of former years. Mrs. Rettew, our much-loved president of the board of managers, has conducted its affairs in a most efficient manner, and the attendance of the members of the board have shown great interest in the work of the home.

Mrs. Boyer, vice-president, directed the work of the assistants and the children in a very capable manner.

Mrs. Brubaker, whom the children dearly love, continues her excellent work in the home.

Miss Segebaum and her assistant are doing excellent work in the school-room, having an enrollment of sixty-seven children in the two rooms. The school has had an attendance of 92 per cent, which shows that the children are in excellent physical condition, and for which we are very thankful. During the year two of our oldest members were called home: Mrs. Lerue Lemer, for many years chairman of the educational committee, whose she gave much of her strength and time, entered into rest, and Mrs. Fager, one of the original members of the board, and for many years an efficient and capable president.

Never in the history of Harrisburg Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, has there been a more enthusiastic gathering and finer program for a Washington's Birthday celebration than that of yesterday afternoon in assembly hall of the Y. M. C. A. A large portrait of the "Father of His Country" hung back of the platform with just below, a pedestal draped with the American flag and bearing a huge white basket of calla lilies. Flags were everywhere, and each guest on entering was presented with a souvenir folder printed in colors with the United States flag, the colors of Pennsylvania and the Harrisburg flag on one side and the words of "The Star Spangled Banner" on the reverse.

The Industrial committee report the boys and girls work throughout the house. The boys have done much in the last year, under the guidance of Mr. Snyder, to keep the house in good condition; varnishing doors, furniture and floors; painting walls; resetting chairs; mending shoes and making a few new chairs. The older boys also give a great deal of help in the laundry. The girls have a cooking class once a week. They also assist in the kitchen and throughout the house generally. Both boys and girls make their own beds and care for their respective dormitories. We cared for, on an average of ninety-three children a month, the largest number was 101 in March, 1916, and the smallest number eighty-one in June, 1916. There were admitted sixty-three boarding children, and sixteen county children, making a total of seventy-nine admissions. There were dismissed seventy-three children. The Associated Aid Societies placed thirty-four children in private homes, which are regularly inspected by them. Thirty-three boarding children were returned to their parents, three county children were placed by the Associated Aid Societies and one Home child was placed by the chairman of the board, the Discharge Committee. It is with much regret that many worthy and needy applications could not be considered for no other reason than this: That there was no room in the Home to take any more children, our Home being filled to its capacity almost continuously during the entire year.

Miss Cora Lee Snyder, the Regent, presided, reading one of the eulogies to George Washington as part of the opening exercises. Mrs. Mary Boyer McCrea, recording secretary, presented interesting minutes of the December meeting when Jackson Herr Boyd just returned from France gave a talk on the American Ambulance Field Service in which he served, and the chapter made a gift of \$100 to the fund.

The chapter went on record as willing to assist in any emergency in which the country may become involved as members of the Red Cross Society of the Woman's Division of National Preparedness or any other war relief organization. This year the Christmas donation from many friends was the largest ever received in the history of the Home, for which we are very thankful.

Owing to the number of cases of infantile paralysis during the summer, the annual outing of the children to Hershey Park was not held last year. Our many thanks are also due to many kind friends who contributed in numerous ways to the welfare of our Home and its children.

Thankful to our Heavenly Father for His many mercies, we entered upon another year, with united faith and love that this, His work, shall be a continued success.
