TRAIN WRECK AVERTED Unidentified Men Stop Express When They Find Boulder on Track Uniontown, Pa., Feb. 26.—Three unidentified men saved the lives of seventy-five passengers on a Buckle, Uniontown and Northern passenger train near Gates, Saturday night, when they struck matches and signalled the train in the dark to stop.

P. R. R. WRECK AT PITTSBURGH Passenger Train Derailed by Boulder and Engineer Killed Pittsburgh, Pa., Feb. 26.—A. Evans, engineer, of Pittsburgh, was killed and two passengers were slightly injured Saturday night, when Pennsylvania passenger train No. 343, for Cleveland, was derailed near Bellevue, a suburb. The entire rain left the track. Evans was thrown from his engine when it overturned, and his body was found beneath a baggage car.

4 KILLED 4 OTHERS Philadelphia, Feb. 26.—Four men were killed, four other injured, seven race horses were mangled and burned to death and a score of express and freight cars were destroyed yesterday when an Adams Express train crashed into wrecked freight cars about a mile above Bristol on the main line of the New York Division of the Pennsylvania railroad. The wreckage burned several hours, and it was not until late in the afternoon that traffic was opened.
