RAILROAD RUMBLER

RAILROADS ASK NEW CREW BILL

Proposed New Jersey Law Gives Powers to Utility Board; Officials Explain

Legislators of New Jersey will consider this week the full crew law repealer. The Associated Railroads of Pennsylvania and New Jersey have issued a statement explaining the railroad side.

The statement is signed by Samuel Rea, president of the Pennsylvania railroad; William H. Truesdale, president of the Lehigh Valley railroad; and A. T. Dice, president of the Philadelphia and Reading Railway. It is as follows:

Under the existing statute an "excess man" crew law not a "full" crew law, as it was named to accomplish its enactment—railroads in New Jersey are compelled to carry on trains where they are not needed some 450 men who would be otherwise very advantageously employed. Railroads do not seek to underman trains. On many trains, passenger and freight, they now put large crews, which are not required, this to insure safe and efficient operation.

What this bill will do is to make certain that all railroads in New Jersey shall properly crew every train. It gives the utilities commissioners full authority to determine how many men are necessary to make certain that trains are safely and efficiently operated, also to prevent excessive duties being required of any man in train service. It protects the public interest, as the present law does not adequately safeguard rights of employees. It relieves the railroads from a useless operating charge now imposed upon them. It makes for economical, so far better, transportation service.

Locomotive Orders Are Running Rather Heavy

Orders for locomotives have been running quite heavy while the orders for freight cars are hardly above normal. The "Railway Age Gazette" calls attention to this trend in the buying of equipment and supplies, and comments upon the situation, in part, as follows: The locomotive order book for the first of the year to the end of last week totaled 724, being at the rate of 6,275 for the full fifty-two weeks of the year, about the same rate as the record figure of 1905. January and February are usually good months but up to the end of the second week of February last year, the locomotive orders totaled only 250, although the total for the first two months last year was 770. The locomotive plants are filled up with orders nearly a year ahead; a railway that orders locomotives at the present time will be fortunate to receive delivery before the first of next year.

FREIGHT AGENT PROMOTED

Two promotions in the freight traffic department of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad will go into effect March 1, when Stuart A. Allen, general Eastern freight agent, will become general freight agent at New York and Golden Shumate, division freight agent, will become assistant general freight agent at Baltimore with jurisdiction over the district east of the Ohio river, except the Pittsburgh, Connersville, Wheeling and Ohio river divisions. His jurisdiction will also extend over Philadelphia and the New England territory.

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SWARTZBILL FOR LAW UNIFORMITY

Would Regulate Extradition of All Persons of Unusual Mind in State

A bill regulating extradition from Pennsylvania of all persons of unusual mind was presented in the House by Mr. Swartz, Dauphin, by request. It is one of the series of proposed acts to make legislation uniform between the States. Persons are held to be of unusual mind if they were, at time of flight from another State, under detention as insane, declared by legal proceedings to be of unusual mind or subject to detention based on legal proceedings. A system of procedure is established.

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HOUSE TO ADJOURN UNTIL MARCH 12

Effort to Cut Recess Until March 6 Is Voted Down 108 to 62

The House of Representatives today voted to adjourn until March 12 when its sessions end this week. An effort to fix March 6 as the date of reassembling was voted down 108 to 62. The resolution was at once missaged to the Senate.

The resolution to adjourn was sponsored by the Democrats, Mr. West, Montour, presenting it and Messrs. Shaffer, Columbia; Sarig and Strauss, Shaffer, speaking for it. Mr. Sarig said that the recess might as well be taken as the House was not accomplishing very much at any rate.

Mr. Wells, Philadelphia, fixing punishment for first degree murder at life imprisonment and declaring in the sense of the Legislature that no person convicted of murder at the time of passage of the act should suffer death if an dthat no person sentenced to life imprisonment should be released except where a pardon would be justified.

Representative Golder, Philadelphia, presented in the House today a bill appropriating \$15,000 for medals for Guardsmen who were in Border service.

SINGLE COUNCIL FOR PHILA. A bill providing for a single chambered council in Philadelphia was introduced in the House today by Mr. Weaver, Philadelphia. The bill was drawn by the charter revision committee and provides for two councilmen from each of the eight wards and districts in the city. It is to be effective January 1, 1918.

FORMER OUTCASTS SPEAK

E. C. Mercer and Thomas Farmer, of New York, both outcasts at the time, but later reformed in the Bowery Mission at New York; spoke last night in the Boyd Memorial Building at the first of a series of meetings for men and boys held under the direction of the Pine Street Presbyterian Church.
