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\$1,300 WORTH OF COPPER STOLEN

Bold Daylight Robbery at Elizabethville Distillery in January Just Discovered

Elizabethville, Pa., Feb. 28.—News of a bold daylight robbery committed some time in January has just come to light. H. H. Weaver, who owns a distillery in the eastern part of the borough, went to one of the buildings last week and found that a large amount of copper in the form of tubes and piping used in the distillery, had been removed. Upon investigation he ascertained that two well-dressed young men applied at the local livery, hired a team. Driving to the distillery they loaded the loot and went to Halifax, going right through town. At Halifax they expressed the material to return the team to this place. A number of citizens saw the loaded wagon go, but thought that Mr. Weaver had sold it to them, and being in midday, gave no thought to robbery. Should Mr. Weaver desire to replace the stolen material, at the present prices, it will cost him about \$1,300.

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
