### WATCH YOUR STEP

A guard invented by Harry Howe, of Rockford, Illinois, acts both as a warning and as an obstruction to a person approaching an open elevator shaft or stairway.

The device, which may be readily attached to one side of the airway in the home, consists of a bracket and a guard member. The bracket is equipped with guides which automatically keep the guard member in normal position when it is not being operated, notes the Popular Science Monthly.


In going down the stairway or into the passageway, it is necessary only to raise the guard member above the step portion on the guide, after which, by slight pressure, it follows the guide, swings to a raised position and returns to the normal position as soon as the person has passed. In coming out of a stairway, a slight pressure of the arm or body swings the guard to a raised position, out of the way.




