DEFENSE LEAGUE IS CAMP PLAN

To Train Men of Forty-Five and Upward to Do Their Bit

New York, March 26.—First steps in what is expected to develop into a national movement for the formation of an internal defense league will be taken in New Haven during the coming week.

Walter Camp, football and college athletic authority, the prime mover in the plan, announced here today that the scheme was intended to physically prepare the men of the nation between the ages of 45 and 60 years for such reserve service as the national government or states might desire in case of war.

No attempt will be made to train the various units in military tactics for the first few months at least, but a concerted effort will be made to bring the voluntary members of the corps to a point of physical preparedness where they will be available for military training or home guard work.

Mr. Camp said that he had been led to take the initial steps in the movement as the result of talks with college presidents, professors and former varsity athletes who, while over the military enlistment age, were eager to do "their bit" in the event of hostilities.
