Senate Reconsiders Vote Killing Bill and Sends It to Committee

The Burke bill to increase the salary of every one in the employ of the state and receiving less than \$1,500 a year, was defeated in the State Senate last night...

Senator Eyre suggested that the bill be sent to committee for some changes, as attention had been called by Commissioner of Health Dixon to the fact that it would cause big increases, proportionately to persons receiving very small allowances from the State.
