SIXTEEN ENLIST IN ARMY

Carlisle, Pa., July 5.—Boiling Springs, with population under 600, and but a fraction of this number to be furnished under the draft, has come to the fore in patriotism. In the last two weeks the town has enlisted sixteen men to the colors. One is at Fort Niagara, two are in the United States army, Dr. E. K.
