IN THE CUMBERLAND VALLEY

CARLISLE BEGINS DRAFT SELECTION

First Examinations For Cumberland County Districts Being Made Today

Carlisle, Pa., Aug. 6.—Selection of the men who will constitute the first quota from Cumberland county to the new National Army began here today when the two boards for this county formally began the work of physical examination.

In all about 400 men have been summoned to appear and these will be examined this week, it is believed. The board for the First district, which includes the section from Carlisle east, is composed of County Commissioner A. E. Deiber, Mechanicsburg; Dr. Harvey B. Basehor, West Fairview, and Jacob Melly, Silver Spring, with Dr. Ambrose Peffer, Carlisle, assistant physician. For the second district, Sheriff Greenwood, Dr. Bruce McCasary, Shippenburg, and County Commissioner D. G. Bishop, Penn township, with Dr. R. M. Shepherd, of Carlisle, as physician, are on the board.

Examinations for District No. 1 were held in the State dispensary here and for No. 2 in the new Kronenberg building.

Many men at the head of the list called have already enlisted. Others have tried to and have been turned down for physical reasons, while many others have dependent claims, so that more than this number may be summoned. The first man in District No. 1 is Louis M. Kemberling, of Enola, and for No. 2, Francis G. Wilson, of Harrisburg, a Carlisle public school teacher.

Lively Runaway Causes Damage at Mechanicsburg

Mechanicsburg, Pa., Aug. 6.—What might have proved a serious accident occurred on Saturday evening when a horse driven by Mr. Martin of New Kingston, ran off, throwing the driver on the paved street and running on the sidewalk and broke two plate glass windows in business district, coming down Main street entirely too fast for the congested condition of the street on that evening.

The horse was notified by Chief Martin that he must slow down. He continued and the wheel of the buggy caught another standing along the street, and the sudden jar threw the horse and buggy over the sidewalk, broke the show window of Miss Kate Swartz's confectionery store and continuing across Market street on the sidewalk crashed into the large plate glass window of the recently-opened store of J. B. Port, and a few doors further caught on a hitching post. Beyond the store, Mr. Martin was not much hurt and the horse escaped serious injury, but the buggy is minus the front two wheels and broken in places. The accident occurred at 10 o'clock.

Isaiah Steigleman, Aged 89, Dies at Shiremanstown

Mechanicsburg, Pa., Aug. 6.—Isaiah Steigleman, a veteran of the Civil War, died at his home at Shiremanstown on Friday evening at the age of 89 years. He was born in York county, but lived at Shiremanstown for the past sixty years, where he followed the trade of shoemaker until ill health and old age caused him to retire. He held the office of postmaster two terms and served in the Civil War in the One Hundred and Thirtieth Regiment, Pennsylvania Volunteers. He was captured and imprisoned in the Andersonville and Florence prisons until discharged. He was a member of Post 58, G. A. R. of Harrisburg, and Irene Lodge, Knights of Pythias, of Shiremanstown. One son, J. B. Steigleman, of Rocky Mount, N. C., survives. The funeral services will be held at his late home to-morrow afternoon at 2 o'clock and burial will be made in St. John's Cemetery.

WEAKLEY FAMILY UNVEILS MARKER

Holds Reunion and Ceremonies on Site Bought by James Weakley in 1730

Carlisle, Pa., Aug. 6.—On Friday last the Weakley Family Association dedicated an appropriate marker on the original Weakley site in Dickinson township. Also held the eighteenth annual meeting at Mount Holly Springs Park, a part of the early grant.

In 1730 James Weakley, who married Jane Wilson secured a patented deed from the Penns to twenty-one sections of land in this locality, which included the section from Dickinson township. The Weakley connection in these parts are all descended from him.

After singing the "Star Spangled Banner" at the marker dedication, Colonel M. A. Embick, of Carlisle, made a prayer and a historical review of the Weakley family was given by Frank Weakley, historian of Carlisle. The massive limestone boulder, suitably engraved in brass and set in concrete, was unveiled by Master William Weakley, of Dayton, Ohio. Robert Weakley Peffer, treasurer of Cumberland county and chairman of the memorial service, delivered the speech of presentation, and Charles Stuart Weakley, of Harrisburg, accepted the stone.

At noon, after singing "America," the clan assembled at the park for the family luncheon. They had as guests of honor Colonel and Mrs. Maurice E. Peffer, Lieutenant Robert Finney, Captain A. H. Baldwin, Sergeant Philip Meredith and Sergeant Clark.

At 2 o'clock a historical, business and memorial program was carried out in the large pavilion.

High points in the afternoon program were the memorial services and addresses by Professor Franklin Menkes, of York, and Mrs. Eugene Dismukes, of Harrisburg.

Carlisle Truck Company Goes to Mt. Gretna

Carlisle, Pa., Aug. 6.—Carlisle sent away her first contingent to the war to-day when the fifty-seven members of the new munition truck company, commanded by Lieutenant C. W. McClune, of Lemoyne, en-camped for Mount Gretna to receive preliminary instruction prior to going to Georgia. The majority of the men are residents of Carlisle.

The history of this organization is unique. It was formed almost over night several weeks ago, about fifty of the men enrolling in five days. They are uniformed and partially equipped and have been drilling and learning field work for the past week. In spite of the early hour when the men took the train there was a large crowd of friends and relatives to cheer them on the way.

On Saturday informal exercises were held at the Cumberland engine house, where the headquarters have been located, when a concert by the Carlisle Red Cross chapter and auxiliaries, while small khaki-covered formations, the gift of the churches of the town, were also presented to the men.
