

NEED MORE MEN TO FILL PERRY'S SERVICE QUOTA

In Total of 276 Called by Board Only 48 Enter National Army

136 PASS EXAMINATION Sixty-five Per Cent. Claim Exemption and 119 Fail to Meet Physical Standard

\$1,000 REWARD IS OFFERED FOR FORTUNE THROWN IN RIVER

Pipe Bending Company Will Pay Liberally For Recovery of Money Shoemaker Sunk in Susquehanna

The Harrisburg Pipe and Pipe Bending Company to-day offered a reward of \$1,000 for the recovery of the package of bills thrown into the Susquehanna river on the night of July 21 by Amos E. Shoemaker, an employe of the company, who is now in the county jail. The package contained banknotes to the value of \$5,100 and was securely tied into a package with a covering of burlap.

The offer of a reward is made in a letter from the Pipe Bending Works officials to C. Floyd Hopkins, manager of the Majestic Theater, and describes the point at which the money was thrown into the river. "The package was thrown into the river," says the letter, "a short distance from the pumping station located at the end of North street, at a point where the current is very rapid."

"Through investigation," the letter continues, "leads us to believe that, owing to the nature of the river bottom and the rapid current, unless the package is located against some stone or other projection in the river bed, it has long since reached the waters of Chesapeake Bay. We are not, therefore, prepared to expend any money on the recovery of this package, but we offer a reward of \$1,000 for the recovery of the package or its contents, and will pay a proportionate amount for any notes recovered, in case the package has been broken apart. There is a possibility that it may have lodged against the dam below the Reading Railroad bridge."

This statement is entirely in keeping with the confession of Mr. Shoemaker. The announcement of the reward was made in connection with a report by Mr. Hopkins of the services of the Society Divers, who appear at this theater Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. While the reward was announced in the letter to Mr. Hopkins and refers to the young ladies of the vaudeville company assisting in the search, the offer is open to any of the dozen diving girls who will reach this city Sunday, but to all who care to take part in the hunt. The package is supposed to contain some \$20 bills.

DRAFT BOARDS ARE CHECKING UP THEIR LISTS
