

NATIONAL ARMY OF 2,300,000 MEN BEING PLANNED

Half Million More Likely to Be Called at Once

Washington, Sept. 20.—In asking Congress for emergency appropriations totalling \$277,418,000, Secretary Baker stated that the money would be required to equip and supply an army of 2,300,000 men.

Secretary Baker's statement was accepted as indicating that this great force will represent America's first tremendous contribution in man-power to the Allies, and that just as rapidly as this force is sent to France new armies will be called under the draft during the next year.

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
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

Soldier Held Under \$1,000 Bail For Court On Serious Charge

Soldiers who come to this city complain that it is almost impossible to secure whisky here. Some of those who do manage to secure a quantity of the cup that cheers would give a substantial sum later to undo their acts while under the influence of liquor.

Yesterday in police court Robert Smith, a young soldier stationed at Gettysburg, was given a hearing upon the serious charge of attempting to assault a young girl in the park near the river. Smith was under the influence of liquor when the attempt was made and after sobering up in a cell had no recollection of what happened.

The soldier came to Harrisburg and met a young girl named Florence Capp. Miss Capp gave her address as Mechanicburg, but is employed here. Smith met the girl in Market street near the police station and invited her to accompany him. Persons who were loitering in the park heard the girl's cries and secured the soldier. He was held under \$1,000 bail for court. It is possible that he will be turned over to the military authorities, after his commanding officers have been heard from.

Mt. Union to Hold Parade For Draft Men Tomorrow

Mount Union, Pa., Sept. 20.—Arrangements were completed last night for the largest patriotic demonstration in the borough to-morrow night in honor of the men who leave for the instruction camp on Saturday afternoon. The town will witness a street parade in which it is expected there will be at least 3,000 marchers. After the parade a patriotic rally will be held in the Shapiro Theater. Efforts are being made to have some of the prominent men of the State deliver addresses. After the rally the men will be guests of honor at an informal social and banquet.

Accused of Trying to Kill Her Husband

Jacksonville, Fla.—The divorce troubles of Ernest G. Phinney and Mrs. Willie Pearl Bussey Phinney, of this city and New York, have been punctuated by a warrant issued accusing the young woman of assault with intent to kill her husband.

M. Phinney, a wealthy lumber dealer, was in the office of his attorney, General Cromwell Gibbins, Saturday afternoon, discussing his action for a divorce and his wife's action in the New York courts for a separation from him, when it is said, she entered.

The warrant accuses Mrs. Phinney of having been armed with a pistol and producing it "in an effort to kill." General Gibbins is said to have seized Mrs. Phinney and there was a struggle about his law offices. Mr. Phinney seemed dazed by the sudden interruption of his conference while the struggle progressed.
