U. S. Judge Would Shoot All Disloyal Senators

Houston, Texas, Oct. 2. — Judge Walter R. Burns, of the United States District Court, in charging the Federal Grand Jury, at the beginning of October term, after calling by name Senators Stone, of Missouri; Hardwick, of Georgia; Vardaman, of Mississippi; Grooms, of North Dakota; Gore, of Oklahoma, and LaFollette, of Wisconsin, said: "I would that you men had jurisdiction to return bills of indictment against these men. They ought to be tried promptly, and fairly, and I believe this court could administer the law fairly; but I have a conviction as strong as life that this country should stand them up against an adobe wall to-morrow and give them what they deserve."

U. S. Soldiers May Keep Cow if They Drink Milk

Washington, Oct. 2. — Soldiers in the American Army not only may keep a cow, but they may feed it at government expense, provided they consume the milk, says a ruling of the Judge Advocate General. The decision was rendered on the question of whether feed for a cow kept by a detachment of soldiers for the production of milk for the detachment mess could legally be purchased from the ration savings in view of the regulation that "such savings shall be used solely for the purchase of articles of food."
