SUIT MAY TAKE RIGHT OF WAY

Owner of Land Along Mount Holly Trolley Line Seeks Ejectment

Carlisle, Pa., Oct. 10.—With two actions before the Public Service Commission on increased fares waiting to be settled, the Cumberland Railway Company, operating lines from Carlisle to Mount Holly Springs and this town to Newville, is again under fire. An ejectment suit has been filed against the company by Mrs. Henrietta L. Kirk, which, if won, will take away a section of the right of way of the corporation at a considerable distance from Mount Holly Park, the chief revenue producing center of the line.
