FIRST LINE OF DEFENSE OF THE GIANTS OF NEW YORK, THE INFIELD



The New York Giants' infield is composed of Holke, first base; Zimmerman, third base. Their batting averages for the season up to second base; Fletcher, shortstop, and date has been as follows: Holke, .275; Zimmerman, .255; Fletcher, .252; and Zimmerman, .255. They do not average so high as the infielders of the White Sox. With Eddie Collins, second baseman of the White Sox, going at the speed he showed with the Athletics, the infield is inferior to that of the Chicago club. There is considerable question if Collins is up to his old form.

FACTS ABOUT WORLD'S SERIES

The National Commission has announced the following official figures for the fourth game of the world's series between Chicago, American League, and New York, National League, at the Polo Grounds, New York: Paid admissions, 27,748; Gross receipts, \$63,742.00; Players' share, \$34,426.00; Each club's share, \$17,213.00; National Commission's share, 8,607.00.

The official figures for the first four games this year, two of which have been played at Comiskey Park, Chicago, and the other two at the Polo Grounds, New York, follow: Paid admissions, 125,362; Gross receipts, \$283,127.00; Players' share, \$152,894.50; Each club's share, \$76,447.25; National Commission's share, 38,223.62. The official figures for the first four games last year, two of which were played on the Braves Field, Boston, and two at Ebbets Field, Brooklyn, follow: Paid admissions, 120,239; Gross receipts, \$301,717.50; Players' share, \$162,927.45; Each club's share, \$81,463.72; National Commission's share, 40,171.75.

The richest series ever played was that between the Boston Red Sox and New York Giants in 1912, which the Sox won. Eight games were played that year and the total receipts amounted to \$490,833.00. The Boston players' 60 per cent. of the first four games amounted to \$88,542.02, and as there were 22 men eligible for the series, each player received \$4,024.68. The Giants shared \$53,028.68 between 23 players, which netted each man \$2,266.00.

RAILROADS ASK HIGHER RATES

Back New Demand With Stronger Arguments; Seek Co-operation of All Roads

New York, Oct. 12.—Coinciding with the announcement yesterday that passenger trainmen on eastern railroads would shortly present demands for increased wages, executives of eastern trunk lines arranged to meet in New York to-day and discuss plans for making another plea to the Interstate Commerce Commission for higher freight rates. The new demands of the railroad brotherhoods for more pay will be a factor in the roads' petition. It was said.

The eastern railroads hope, it is said, that the western and southern roads will also renew pleas for higher rates. Ordinarily, applications for rate increases are presented separately by the three districts. In the last case, all roads joined in the petition for an increase of 15 per cent. in freight rates. The Interstate Commerce Commission in its finding last June, refused the increase asked for but granted increases of approximately five per cent. of the gross revenue of the carriers. Have Stronger Case The commission pointed out at the time that if the railroads felt they could present a stronger case the petition for higher rates might be renewed. Since last June, the income of southern and western roads has not fallen to the extent that the net earnings of the eastern roads are said to have dropped. When reports are
