


CENTRAL TEAM IS AT CARLISLE



Reading, Pa., Nov. 28.—William B. Eckert's string of nine horses, several of which he recently sold, earned almost \$9,000 for him in the last season. The record, as made up by his trainer, A. W. Grand total, twenty-one firsts, nineteen and one-half seconds, eighteen and one-half thirds, eleven fourths. Money total, \$8,937.

Farmers Got 21 Cents Lb. For Turkeys This Year

Washington, Nov. 8.—The nation's Thanksgiving turkey this year will cost a little more than it did a year ago. Reports to the Department of Agriculture, made public yesterday, show that poultry growers were receiving an average of 14 cents per pound more for turkeys and 8.1 cents more for chickens on November 15 than they received on the same date last year.
