Surrounding Counties Do Their "Bit" For Harrisburg Institution

Numerous donations are still pouring into the receiving rooms of the Harrisburg Hospital, and donations are exceeding all expectations of the committee from the Women's Aid Society, which has charge of the donations.

Former patients and friends of the patients of the hospital were numerous among the donors to the hospital yesterday. The gifts came from all over Dauphin County and other surrounding counties and from the friends of the hospital in the city.

Among the towns represented by donations were Middletown, Shrewsbury, Mechanicsburg, Washington Heights, Camp Hill, Bowmansdale, Rose Garden, Silver Springs Church, Hogestown and Steelton. The churches and schools of those towns sent generous donations. Gelwick and Snavely, of Mechanicsburg, furnished their trucks all day yesterday to haul donations to the hospital.

Practically all the donations have been collected. There are a few calls from patients made to-day, and from outlying points, but no more will come in during the day. Anyone who has a hospital bag that is not filled, is requested by the hospital authorities to return it to be used next year.

The donations will be invoiced by a grocer in a few days and a report will be made to the state. The money in charge of the donation state that there is no doubt that the donations exceed those of any previous year. They expressed their thanks to the people for their generous donations, and the merchants and workers who contributed to the success of the holiday donation. Individuals and firms who contributed money were also thanked by the women in charge.
