

SHORTAGE OF MEN, NOT MONEY, SAYS F. A. VANDERLIP

Warning Against Danger of Paper Money Inflation, a Possible Danger

By Associated Press. St. Paul, Minn., Dec. 13.—Warning against the danger of paper money inflation as a means of financing the war was given to-day by Chairman Frank A. Vanderlip, of the War Saving Committee, in addressing a bankers' luncheon in behalf of the War Saving Stamps campaign.

The government faced a shortage of men and material, not money, he declared, and therefore the printing press could never satisfy the needs arising from the war.

"There are some impressive reasons why this campaign for economy should have the strongest support of men of large affairs, of great corporations, of savings banks, and of all interests that are concerned with the future security value," Mr. Vanderlip continued.

"At no time in the world's history when paper money inflation has anywhere been tried was there a corporate condition such as we have to-day; a situation where there are many, many billions of dollars of securities issued by public security corporations whose income is fixed by law. The advancing price of all things which corporations must have to live, the prices of labor, fuel, equipment, supplies of every sort, would show quick response to the inflation of the currency but the income of those corporations would still be governed by legal contracts or governmental regulation."

GARFIELD WIRES INTERFERENCE IS NOT ALLOWED

Fuel Administrator Warns Ohio Executive That Government Is Supreme

OHIO PEOPLE SUFFERERS Following Many Complaints, Governor Takes Coal Situation Into Own Hands

By Associated Press. Washington, Dec. 13.—Fuel Administrator Garfield to-day informed Governor Cox, of Ohio, that he would not be permitted to interfere with the distribution of coal in Ohio under the direction of the state fuel administration.

Dr. Garfield sent to Governor Cox the following telegram: "I am respectfully but firmly requesting that you do not interfere with the orderly distribution of coal in Ohio under orders issued by my authority to Homer H. Johnson, Federal fuel administrator for Ohio. He has full authority to act, and F. C. Baird is co-operating with him. I must insist that the state authority be not permitted to interfere with the action of the United States fuel administrator."

Washington, Dec. 13.—Any pressing need for coal in Ohio that Governor Cox can show will be met immediately, Dr. Garfield said, by the fuel administration. Seizure of coal by the Governor, reported in press dispatches, will only bring confusion and add to the difficulties of the situation.



Teutons Hurl Great Force at Italy in New Drive

The effect of the collision was immediate. Thick black smoke poured from the hold. It was impossible to put out the fire. In order not to uselessly sacrifice lives he ordered the crew to abandon the ship.

Miss Jean Groves, operator at the private branch telephone exchange at the dockyards, remained at her post and sent out calls for doctors, fire department and other aid until the relief ship Northland arrived.
