\$20,000 NEEDED AT COUNTY HOME

Cumberland Poor Directors and Board of Visitors Ask For Larger Appropriation

Carlisle, Pa., Dec. 20.—Presentation of the requisition for 1918 and of the report of the Board of Visitors to the County Home came to the county commissioners at nearly the same time. In view of increasing expenses, the poor board asks for \$20,000 during the coming year, with an additional appropriation of \$2,500, this sum to be expended in making improvements authorized by the visitors and the grand jury.

The final report of the visitors reported many improvements during the year, among them being the installation of new heating and sewer systems. They urge further sanitary improvements and additional buildings during 1918. The commissioners will act on the request on Saturday.
