DOG LICENSES MUST BE BOUGHT

State Officials Give Warning Regarding the Operation of the New Dog Code

Every dog in every township, borough and third class city of Pennsylvania will have to be licensed and kept under restrictions laid down in the new dog law which becomes effective on January 15

The new law which is expected to prove a big factor in the increase of sheep and other livestock in the state provides that the owners of all dogs under six months of age must obtain licenses from the county treasurer or a justice of the peace, and the metal license tag must be worn by the dog at all times.

A summary issued today says: "Night straying is prohibited and the owners of dogs must, between sunset and sunrise, keep all dogs confined or attached to chain or under reasonable control. It is unlawful for any person to harbor or keep about his premises any unlicensed dog."

Any person may kill any dog, which he sees in the act of pursuing, worrying or wounding any livestock, or attacking human beings whether or not such dog bears the proper license tag required by the provisions. There shall be no liability on such persons in damages or otherwise for such killing.

The Department is urging reporting to it of all corn available for sale to the public beyond requirements of owners so that the threatened shortage may be overcome.

To Hear Argument The Public Service Commission early in the new year in the complaints that the Pennsylvania and Reading systems violated the state's fuel law in the operation of trains in the Mt. Pleasant and Mahanoy regions respectively. The briefs will again be argued before the whole commission.

Collins Congratulated. — There were many congratulations sent today to Emerson Collins, deputy attorney general for the last three years and promoted Monday night to be deputy at \$5,000.

Expected Monday.—Edmund K. Trent, of Pittsburgh, new deputy attorney general, is expected on Monday to take up his duties.

Capitol Is Slow.—The State Capitol was slow getting down to work after the holiday. The auditor general and state treasurer will not open their departments immediately.

To Take Up New Work.—Miss Elizabeth C. Sheehan, long connected with the Governor's office, will on January 1 take up her work connected with the registration of fictitious names for firms in the department of the Secretary of the Commonwealth.

STATE CROPS RUN HIGH IN VALUE

Interesting Figures Out; Captain Riddle to Talk on Sanitation in the Big Camps

Figures issued today by the State Department of Agriculture as the result of a study of crop reports made from every county are to the effect that the total value of the Pennsylvania corn, oats, wheat, buckwheat, rye and potato crops for 1917 was \$240,272,200.35 as compared with \$226,038,118.57.

The statement was also made today that because of late planting the condition of the wheat and rye in the ground at this time is about seven per cent below the average for the last ten years.

In many places, it is declared, the shortage of labor retarded planting. Figures issued by the Department show that the average price of butter in the state during the year was forty-six cents a pound; the average price for female labor on the farm \$4 a week as compared with an average of \$3.42 last year.
