

GOVERNOR BRUMBAUGH TO ADDRESS MASS MEETING AT Y. M. C. A. TOMORROW

BIG REVIVAL ON SECOND WEEK

Campaign at Stevens M. E. Meeting With Much Success

The second week of the big evangelistic drive at the Stevens Memorial Methodist Church opens to-morrow. At the early morning service, beginning at 9:30 o'clock, H. B. Turner will tell the thrilling story of his conversion, which occurred less than two years ago. It is expected that many will want to hear him and arrangements have been made to hold the service in the Sunday school room. Dr. Clayton Albert Smucker will call the roll of the members of the "Win-One League" at 10:30. The mobilization service will be held at this hour. The evangelistic program is to be taken into the Sunday school room at 2. All the young folk of the church and congregation have been invited to the special Epworth League meeting in the early evening at 6:30. In the evening at 7:30 Dr. Smucker is to be in charge of the big evangelistic rally. All members of the "Win-One League" will occupy the reserved seats. The sermon subject is to be "Looking Into the Kingdom of Possibility." An after-meeting will follow the rally service in the Sunday school room. Every night meetings will be held in the church during the week.

Revival at Sixth Street U. B. Church Continue During Week

The revival services in the Sixth Street United Brethren Church, Rev. Joseph Daugherty, pastor, which are being conducted by the Evangelist Stephen A. Zuber, have been growing in interest and helpfulness during the week. The evangelist will conduct three services on Sunday. MANY NEW CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR SOCIETIES FORMED

Christian Endeavorers have accomplished great things in their far-reaching activities during the past few months. At the meeting of the executive committee of the United States and the trustees of the World's C. E. Union, held at the headquarters, Boston, recently, many excellent reports were made. President Francis E. Clark, D. D., L. L. D., reported that if a service flag could be hung from the headquarters building it would have to bear more than 100,000 stars to represent the members who have responded to the call to the colors, and if stars were added for war service in other lines, millions would be needed. In spite of the exacting demands of war work, the movement is having a wonderful increase in numbers. China reports more than 1,000 societies, India 1,500. Japan has doubled its membership in the past year and South American reports renewed interest and activity.

The Disciples of Christ are in a campaign for 2,400 new societies in two weeks, and already reports more than 1,700. The Rev. D. A. Polling, associate president, has returned from a most profitable series of conventions in Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Ohio, Massachusetts, Maryland and Virginia. While the attendance was not as usual in every case, there was a noticeable absence of young men. In some societies, only young men in the war service, reported that the societies are busy in war work, co-operating with the Y. M. C. A. in camps and cantonments, conducting meetings and furnishing entertainments. In one case the societies furnish the entire fitment for the Y. M. C. A. hut, even contributing six canary birds to add to the homelike atmosphere. The boys were delighted and the birds do not lack for attention.

Zion Lutheran Sunday School Will Give Collection to Aid Armenians

At Zion Lutheran Church, the pastor, the Rev. S. Winfield Herman, will speak at both services to-morrow, having as themes "Three Elements of Faith" and "Have You Met Jesus?" An opportunity was given the members last Sunday to contribute to the Armenian and Syrian Relief Fund. The offering in the Sunday school will be devoted to this great need. The pastor began his fifteenth year in connection with Zion last Sunday and his thirteenth as pastor. During the twelve years of his pastorate he received 1,345 members into the baptized membership of the church, 1,061 of whom were adults. During the past year the internal and external benevolences of Zion have been greater than those of any church in the General Synod. With comfortable equipment and a most harmonious congregation the future of this old-fashioned downtown congregation is most promising. Announcement has been made that the church gladly offers to families and individuals actually suffering from lack of coal the warmth of our social rooms. Rehearsals for the Reformation Pageant to be given in Chestnut Street Hall will continue each evening. The proceeds of this entertainment will be given to the National Lutheran War Commission for the welfare of the soldiers and sailors. It will provide equipment for military and civilian chaplains and ministers to the distinctive religious needs of our men at the front, working in harmony and co-operation with the Y. M. C. A. and other organizations. The mid-week service will be conducted by the pastor and pictures of the life of Christ and the study of the Gospel of Mark will be continued. The Young Women's Missionary Society will meet at the parsonage on Saturday evening. This organization has just received a letter of which was sent to one of the worthy home missionaries.
